great sea boat, and made port in safety, although suffering some minor mishaps to her deck house. Repairs were effected and the vessel proceeded to Belleoram, where she took on board 3,000 barrels of frozen herring and started for New York.

Again she had the misfortune to run into boisterous weather, detaining her somewhat which left her supply of fuel oil short, and in order to replenish her supply her commander, Capt. Jerry LeBlanc, of Margaree Forks, ran into St. Pierre.

Sunday night the steamer set out on her run to New York, but meeting with another gale, Capt. LeBlanc was unable to keep her off the treacherous rocks at this dangerous place, and she was piled high and dry, and in the opinion of those who viewed the spot she is likely to remain there.

The ill-fated craft, which was built at Jackson's Wharf, was valued at upwards of \$75,000, was owned by local and Sydney parties, W. M. MacDonald, of the latter place, being managing owner. It is understood she is fairly covered by insurance, as was also her cargo.

All the crew were able to make land, and are expected here in about a week's time. Capt. Ernest Young, her first officer, left the Permanencia when the vessel first put into St. Pierre, and is at present at his home here.

Spurious Newfoundland 50-cent pieces continue to be worked off in nearly every business establishment in town. In one large store no less than twelve "queer" coins of the above denomination were taken over the counters in one day. The dates on the majority of the bogus coins are generally 1899 and 1919, and it requires more than the ordinary scrutiny to detect their worthlessness. In one establishment the proprietor was approached by a stranger who asked the former to show him any and all 50-cent Newfoundland pieces he had in his register. The request was complied with, the stranger meanwhile telling of the circulation of the spurious money. To the astonishment of the proprietor he had about \$3 of the worthless stuff. The stranger, who appeared to act in an official capacity, told the surprised storekeeper to continue accepting any such money, but to be particular in "sizing the fellow up" so that he would be able to identify him if called upon. ## Atlantic Waves

## Measured.

The size of the waves of the Atlantic ocean has been carefully ascertained as a result of extensive investigations made by the officers of the hydrographic office of the United States Navy Department. In height, we are assured, these waves usually average 30 feet, but in rough weather they will attain some 40 to 48 feet. During storms they are frequently from 500 to 600 feet long and endure 10 to 11 seconds. The longest wave measured by the hydrographic office officials was half a mile, and it did not spend itself for 35 seconds.
