Some Press Opinion on the U.S. Tariff.

The following extract taken from the New York Literary Digest forms interesting reading, containing as it does some American press opinions on the New Tariff. The building of high tariff walls in all countries is proceeding apace, administrations deeming in their wisdom that protection is panacea for all industrial ills. The erection of tariff barriers may have something in their favor but as a rule duty wars are not productive of or beneficial to mutual trade. Fordney Tariff hits Newfoundland with its high duty on fish and fish products, but there is a possibility that an amicable and equitable agreement may be subsequently made between this country and the United States. 
