### Christian Brothers' Collection.

#### LARGE AMOUNT RECEIVED.

The annual collection for the Christian Brothers, was taken up in the R. C. Churches yesterday morning, and amounted to \$8,179.57. This amount is \$858.77 less than last year's record, but it will be augmented by several other amounts which have yet to come in. The collection, everything considered, is a splendid testimonial to the work of the Brothers. Immediately after Last Mass, the collectors assembled at Mount St. Francis, where the Hon. J. D. Ryan, on behalf of the Cathedral, passed over the amount to Rev. Bro. Ahern, Superior of the Community, paying a well deserved tribute to the work of the Brothers in the cause of education. Messrs. M. Bambrick, (St. Patrick's) R. Jardine, (St. Joseph's) and Rev. Brother Ennis, (Mount Cashel) also made short speeches in passing over the amounts from the various parishes. Rev. Brother Ahern in reply thanked the people for their splendid collection, observing that while the amount was not as great as last year, still the purchasing power was even greater, and he considered it a whole-hearted appreciation from a generous people. Congratulatory speeches were also made by Dr. V. P. Burke, Bro. J. E. Ryan, (St. Bon's) W. J. Higgins, President of the B.I.S., C. J. Cahill, J. Fitzgibbon and E. D. Spurrell. #### AT ST. PATRICK'S.

The annual collection for the Christian Brothers at St. Patrick's which was taken up at all the Masses on Sunday, was a record one, amounting to over twenty-six hundred dollars, being about fifty dollars in advance of last year's amount. ### The Oldest and Youngest Spot on Earth.

New Guinea, the second largest island on the globe, occupies the paradoxical position of being at once the oldest and the youngest spot on the earth.

There are found animals that roamed centuries ago, when ferns grew to the size of giant trees and glaciers were making valleys, and there too is one of the few unexplored portions of the world.

Thirty-six years ago Great Britain, Holland and Germany divided the island on paper, and with the exception of a few trading spots on the coast little change has been made. The portion formerly held by Germany has been placed under the control of Australia.

The interior is still held by wild tribes which bear a strange resemblance to the negroes of Africa and their origin is a mystery. The Papuans, as the natives are called, are Ethiopian in almost every characteristic—woolly hair, flat noses and thick lips, while the natives of the adjacent island are Malayan.

The Papuans seem to have a weakness for elevated homes. In the northern and eastern portions of the island they build their houses on piles and in the south-eastern part they live in rude huts in the trees. While undeniably savage, head hunting and cannibalism are still practised there; the natives have the virtue of cleanliness to a marked degree. Bathing with them is almost a part of their religion, and they believe the spirits of the departed are as much addicted to water as the living. This belief accounts for the carefully made paths which lead from every grave in a tribal cemetery to the water. The living have made smooth the way of the dead to the bath.

The area of the island is close to 200,000 square miles and supports a population estimated at 1,000,000. Virtually the only portion of the island known is the coastal region and is, of course, tropical in character, as the equator is only about twenty miles off its northern-most point. The animal life in New Guinea is

strange to western eyes and represents a fauna of bygone ages. All of the native animals are marsupials, having pockets, like the opossum of North America, and many of them lay eggs, like birds. In the number and beauty of its birds the island is without a rival. One of the most beautiful members of the feathered family native to the island is the gorgeous bird of paradise. Bird skins form one of the chief items of export from the island.
