ANDREW SOCIETY PAYS
TRIBUTE TO VETERAN MEM-
BER.

Mr. A. K. Lumsden, who holds the exceptional record of a half century's membership in the St. Andrew's Society, was duly honored Wednesday when a gathering of his associates presented him with a splendid walking cane and address. Mr. Lumsden, who is Honorary President of the St. Andrew's Society, joined the club in 1872, and during his years of membership has been elected to every office in the organization. The presentation was preceded by a short report in which the following ladies took part: Mrs. McNeill, Misses Mitchell, Langmead, and Messrs. Calvert, Law, and Hon. John Anderson. The presentation of the "Blue Bells of Scotland" by Miss Langmead was especially good and she was congratulated at the conclusion. The presentation made by Vice-President Lumsden, took the form of a beautiful ebony walking stick, with gold mounted handle, suitably engraved, and especially imported by Mr. Geo. Langmead, Jeweller. Mr. Ross also read the following address which was warmly bound and will be a souvenir of the auspicious event.

ADDRESS

Andrew K. Lumsden, Esq., Honorary President, on the completion of his Jubilee Year (1872-1922) as member of Newfoundland St. Andrew's Society.

Dear Mr. Lumsden.—We have met tonight to celebrate the auspicious happy termination of your fifty years' membership in St. Andrew's Society, and to present you with this address.

From past records, and from our own knowledge, you, sir, have always been a deep interest in its social and athletic activities, but also in its service to the community, and whatever the Society has attained in its various objects, has been largely due to the keen interest which you have invariably taken in matters connected with it.

During your half century of membership in the Society, you have at all times displayed a willingness to shoulder many of the responsibilities of the Society, and in repeated instances your ready fact and sound judgment have been of incalculable assistance to your fellow-members.

We therefore feel, sir, that such a unique record as yours cannot be allowed to pass without some tangible memento of your long and honorable connection with St. Andrew's Society, and it gives us great pleasure to ask your acceptance of this walking stick, with the hope that you may be long spared to use it, and that it may be some little assistance in helping you to the cobble stones of life many years to come.

Such men as the Boyds, Bairds, Wilsons, Ledinghams were men of strength in their day and the Society's present position was due to a large measure to their efforts. Complimentary speeches were also made by Hon. John Anderson, J. J. McKay, A. McKinty and A. G. Gibb, after which the gathering joined in singing "For he's a jolly good fellow." Tea was then served to the Ladies' Auxiliary after which dance was held and one of the events in the annals of the St. Andrew's Society was brought to a close shortly after midnight.
