Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir—I feel called upon to ask those whose duty it is to regulate motor traffic in the city, to prevent the passing of cars from LeMarchant Road to Freshwater Road and vice versa, through the thoroughfare between the Park and Miss Corbett's residence. The corner at the junction of this thoroughfare and Freshwater Road is "blind." Pedestrians are constantly passing this corner, and children, especially, on whose behalf this note is written, are continually running, not walking, round there, heedless of danger. That there has not been an accident hitherto is due solely to Providence and not to the motorist. I have seen cars pass through there at excessive speed, often without the warning sound, and some of them actually skim the corner. Cars can just as conveniently pass around the east end of the park from one street to the other, in sight of any one, whether on pleasure bent or otherwise, and no time need be lost. **The Newfoundland Memorial College and Normal School!**

At the opening in September next advanced classes will be organized under the presidency of MR. JOHN LEWIS PATON, M.A. (CAMBRIDGE).

In addition to the Professional training of teachers, the Institution will furnish courses for the first and second years of University work in liberal Arts and pure Science; the curriculum will include English, Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics (and other Sciences), French, Latin, Greek, Spanish, and other subjects for which there may be a demand.

The Memorial College will be associated with the principal universities of North America and the British Isles, and its certificate accepted pro tanto. In the case of the universities in North America, this will reduce the residence abroad to two years.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATION: Junior Associate (Matriculation) of the Council of Higher Education with a general average of fifty per cent. or equivalent examination to be set by the College shortly before the date appointed for the opening.

SPECIAL STUDENTS: Students not desiring the full course may be admitted to any class as special students provided they are able to present evidence of qualification for such class.

An important purpose of the College is to help forward in any of the subjects named any student who has already reached the Junior Associate (Matriculation) standard (C.H.E.).

FEEs: For the full course of five subjects or classes \$40.00 per annum will be charged, and \$10.00 for special subjects.

The President is at present engaged in securing a suitable staff of Professors for the institution. Mr. S. P. Whiteway, B.Sc. (Columbia University), will continue in charge of the teacher-training or normal classes.
