Parliamentary.

After the excitement of the debate and vote on the Treaty Bill, on Thursday night, the House has again settled down to ordinary business On Friday, in reply to a question, Sir John A. Macdonald said no arrangement had been made between Her Majesty's Government and the Dominion about the money compensa-tions to be awarded Canada under the 22nd article of the Washington Treaty, the money would belong to Canada and be subject to vote of Parliament. Commissioners in deter-Canada and be subject to vote of Parliament. Commissioners in determining compensation to be paid Canada would be limited as to the line of its bestowal on the Treaty period of twelve years. He also stated that the bill to give effect to the Treaty, could not go into effect until an order in Council authorized it. The Government could make no pledge in advance that it would not go into operation before the Alabama claims were settled. The Government would continue to give sufficient protection till the fisheries were open to the Americans by law. On Mr. Colby's Bill to repeal the insolvency laws.
