us Condition of Walkerton Gaol. We find in the Telescope of last week, a condensed report of the evidence taken by Mr. Langmuir, Prison Inspector, who was appointed to inquire into the condi-tion of the County Gaol there, and into the truth of charges made against the Sheriff and Gaoler in connection there-with. From what has already transpir-ed this investigation has taken place none too soon. A boy Haag was confined in the gaol; for the first four months he was taken out into the yard for half an hour every alternate day, and chained to a bar in the window, in front of his cell, for half an hour on the other days ; al-ways in irons. Once he was deprived of

ways in irons. Once he was deprived of his bed and bedding, for four or five days;

he slept in his day clothes, and had noth-ing in his cell but his night bucket. For

he slept in his day clothes, and had noth-ing in his cell but his night bucket. For five or six weaks of hot weather in August and September, he never was let out of his cell. The iron gate into his corridor was covered with a heavy wooden door, and the windows put down; the atmo-sphere in the corridor was suffocating. For three months after his trial he never was out of his cell. A prisoner jumped over the wall and was found lying in the field helpless. The Gaoler left him there. The Turn-key, after waiting some time, took him on his back, and had to lay him down four times to open and close gates. When they got in the Gaoler was waiting ; he said he wished the prisoner was dead and in h-I. A lunatic was reading the bible on Sunday; the Gaoler forced it from him ; he afterwards scuffled with him to get the water-bucket. from him, jammed him against the wall, threw him down on the floor, and held him there four or five minutes. He was ordered to have no water that day; it was a hot summer day; he did not get any for twelve hours. Next morning he was put in a punishment cell, where he remained three days, without bed or bedding; a large proportion of his time he had no convenience; he stood for nearly the whole time in his excreta; the Gaolor would not have it removed to punish the lunatic. A quarter of the gaol was so filthy

would not have it removed to punish the lunatic. A quarter of the gaol was so filthy that people in the Turnkey's quarters were sickened by the fumes and could not take their meals. Grave charges are also made against the Gaoler for his brutal treatment of lunatics, and for nucle intimacy with female prisoners. A good deal of evi-dence remains to be taken.
