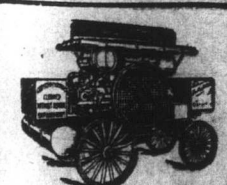

Mr. Day Tells of The Favorable Outlook at Daysland

E. W. Day, mayor of Daysland, is spending a few days in the city on his way south to spend a few weeks in Iowa. Mr. Day reports that the town which he founded and which bears his name, and the surrounding district are progressing very rapidly.

Seeding operations are being pushed ahead and most of the fall plowed land is seeded. As it is early in the season the farmers will continue to plow and seed additional land as long as they consider that the crop will have time to mature, after which they will devote their attention to breaking for next season's crop.

Fall wheat is in excellent condition but the mainstay of the districts along the Watkinson branch, is spring wheat, for which this district is adapted. "One of the great things I have noticed has been that the original homesteaders is selling out to the men from Ontario and from Iowa who have the money to start right in and farm the land. We are getting into the Daysland district the finest class of men that there is in the province of Alberta."

"The Royal Chef."

de facto, Mr. Roosevelt will not go to the Methodists, and the audience will occur.

Mr. O'Loughlin refused to give his assurance.

The Cardinal then added: "Mr. Roosevelt is free to go to the Methodists and do what he chooses, but the Pontiff is certainly free not to receive a man who would claim the right to insult him on the day after having been by him, or perhaps on the same day, as according to your statement, he may leave Rome on the same day of the papal audience, thus leaving only between noon and evening, Tuesday, in which to see the Methodists."

"It is of little consequence, whether he is a Catholic, Protestant, Jew, or Buddhist. All religious persons merit the same esteem. The important thing is to be honest and sincere. So far as the form of belief is concerned, I believe that all honest people will be always on good terms with God."

Bern, Switzerland, April 4.—Switzerland's largest Catholic college, the Mariabild, located near Schwyz, with the church library and valuable scientific collection was burned last night. The five hundred students and professors had narrow escapes.
