OFFICIAL RESULTS OF PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS WILL BE MADE KNOWN TONIGHT; SUMMARY SHOULD BE LIBERALS 36, OPPOSITION 11, DOUBTFUL 7, DEFERRED 2

Both Sides Are Claiming Victory in Doubtful Ridings, including Innisfail, Macleod, Rocky Mountain, Clearwater, Edmonton, Medicine Hat, Alexandria

The final and definite results of the provincial general elections held on April 17, last, will be made known some time today or tonight, as today is the date set for the official counting of the ballots by the chief officers for the various constituencies.

The latest unofficial returns give the Liberals 36 seats, the Conservatives 11, doubtful seats 7, and two seats in which the elections were deferred. The 36 seats held by the Liberals and the 11 held by the Conservatives at the present time are distributed as follows: The seats which are in doubt are those of Innisfail, Macleod, Rocky Mountain, Clearwater, Edmonton, Medicine Hat, Alexandria, and the seat of the Yukon in the federal election.

In Macleod, where Premier Hon. A. I. Sifton ran against John Patterson, the sitting Conservative member, who was elected as an independent at a bye-election in 1911, but who immediately joined the Conservative party and has never voted with the government, the Conservatives were victorious by a majority of five. The Conservatives claim that the official count will give them the seat, and the Liberals claim that they will win it.

Not at All Opposed to City Putting Advantages in the Way of Rival Concern, but Is of Opinion Same Advantages Should Go to Older Concerns.

Manager of Robin Hood Company Says His Firm Is Employing 150 Men and Will Have Expended \$200,000 in the Course of a Few Months.

Big Frisco Police Graft Discovered By Arrest of Crooks Known in Calgary

Paulino Necci and Rossi Traced by Detectives from Here to Winnipeg and Detained There, and Will be Taken Back to California to Face Serious Charge of Fraud with Four Companions Held There.

Arrested in Winnipeg through the smart action of Pinkerton operatives who traced them from Calgary to the Manitoba city and had them incarcerated there, Paulino Necci, alias Gastoldi, and another Italian named Necci, are being held by the chief of police of San Francisco, which will take them back to California to answer to charges of duping a merchant of that city out of \$5,000.

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The men are part of a gang of Russian desperadoes who have been active in the United States and whose depredations are said to run high up into the thousands. The gang are already under arrest in San Francisco and it was from confessions obtained from those already held that the police in Winnipeg were enabled to determine who the men held in Winnipeg were. Calgary and the rest of the world have given the names mentioned above, but their names were not known until the police in Winnipeg were notified by the San Francisco police that they were engaged on this work.
