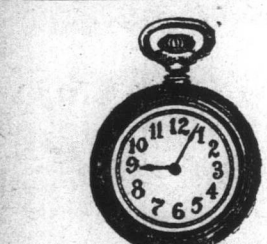

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CANADIAN GOVT IS PLUTOCRATIC IN THE SPIRIT

J. C. Hunt Gives Interesting Address at the Forum Sunday Afternoon

While the government of Canada is democratic in form, it is really plutocratic in spirit, was one of the statements made by J. C. Hunt, clerk of the executive council Sunday afternoon at the Forum.

Mr. Hunt gave a masterful address on "The New Plutocracy." In this address he outlined the principles which underlay all governments and set forth what he believed was necessary to make good government. He pointed out some of the inconsistencies of the present form of government and outlined some possible remedies.

The speaker emphasized the fact that he was attacking systems, not individuals. "It is not the form of government that makes the people free. It is better to have the worst form of government with righteousness in the rulers and character in the people than the best form of government with grafters for rulers and the people indifferent to moral principles." He held that any government that allowed the people's treasury to be looted by the big interests was a rich man's government regardless of its form. He held that the burden of taxation should be shifted from the shoulders of the producers to the possessors of wealth.

Not only have we failed to train our native-born citizens in the duties of citizenship, but we have brought in vast numbers of immigrants who are ignorant of the first duties of citizenship and have failed to enlighten them. "Democracy is a government in which every man, by virtue of his manhood alone—every woman, by virtue of her womanhood alone—has an equal voice in the affairs of the common country; that is, in making the laws of the land." The granting of the franchise on any basis that is not universal, but is applicable to classes only, is a direct blow at democracy, and is a menace to our national institutions. "All or nothing and certainly should be that all—loyal members of the nation should be allowed to vote."

All Are Responsible.
"No one who enjoys the advantages of life in Canada should be excused from meeting his responsibilities."

Our present representative system is defective in many ways and open to serious attack. It is possible to manipulate matters so as to defeat the will of the majority. In party politics there is no election, but simply a chance to reject the worse of two undesirable. The speaker thought that proportional representation would remedy many of the abuses of the present system. The ruling power is not inherent in the members of the legislature, but it is with the people who elect them.

Necessary to Citizenship.
To be capable citizens implies that you have:
1. Sense enough to judge of public affairs.
2. Discernment enough to choose right men to office.
3. Self control enough to accept the decision of the majority.
4. Honesty enough to seek the general interest rather than your own at the expense of the community.
5. Public spirit enough to take trouble, or even, if necessary to face danger, for the good of your country.

The speaker thought that men in the trenches had set an example to all of true citizenship. There selfishness was forgotten and the love of gain put aside. Rank and distinctions do not count; politics are eschewed and good fellowship prevails. He contrasted the spirit of gain that prevails in Canada with the spirit of the trenches and called for noble and true leaders.

The lack of such leaders he thought was to be found in the fact that the people are no longer king because power has arisen in our governments stronger than the people themselves; and because of the lowering of our moral standards.

Must Be Intelligent.
If the people are to rule they must be intelligent, moral and free. This freedom involves free speech, free press, free assemblies, free ballot and a free petition. It also involves economic freedom. A man cannot be free and independent without a livelihood, a home, some business or occupation or interest to give him concern for the welfare and good order of the community. A laborer must be as free to follow his own judgment as his rich neighbor.

The people must be patriotic. The government may be all wrong, and it may be the patriot's duty to use his best endeavors to change the government's policy.

In addition to intelligence, virtue, freedom and patriotism, and in order to maintain these, a people must have a religion, a free church in a free state. The nation has a soul.

At the head of all the world's historical events stand individuals. The creative forces of the world are personal. Principles are ineffective until they take the form of a personality and inhabit a human soul. To build up an intelligent citizenship you must have leaders.

The speaker wound up with an appeal to the youth of the land to endeavor high things and to do their best. An energetic discussion followed, which ranged largely around the definition of "democracy." The extreme Socialists held that democracy with a few was not democracy at all, and the speaker and the chairman held that there was such a thing as comparative democracy and stages in democracy.

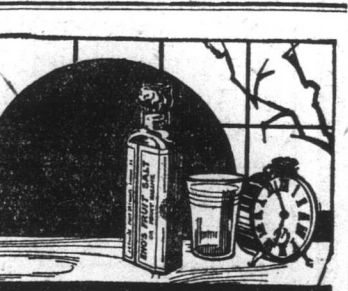

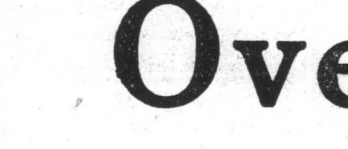

TWO MILLION BUSHELS WERE UNLOADED YESTERDAY

Railways Lifting Embargo at Grain Terminals. Permanent Peace to Result

Fort William, Oct. 8.—The situation at the elevators is becoming more normal. Approximately two million bushels were unloaded today, according to Director of Elevators L. H. Boyd, and this amount will probably be exceeded tomorrow. Owing to the strike not being definitely called off until last night, the start this morning was somewhat delayed, and this being a holiday night work is not being done at some of the terminal houses.

The arrival of the minister of labor tomorrow morning is awaited with anxiety on both sides, some fear being expressed that there may be a recurrence of trouble, but it was tonight definitely stated by a man in close touch with the men's committee that the present truce will be unbroken and that a permanent peace will be declared within the next forty-eight hours.

Raising Embargo.
Winnipeg, Oct. 8.—Statements as to raising the embargo on loading cars for Fort William were conflicting. The Canadian Northern railway raised the embargo Sunday. It was understood at the time that this was to fill a million and a quarter bushels' empty space in the Smith & Davidson elevator, they claiming they had sufficient men to unload.

When the strike was thought settled it was expected the Canadian Pacific railway would raise the embargo on loading at once, and apparently such was the intention. But when it was learned that the strike was by no means settled, nothing was done. However, it was understood, on good authority, that orders went out this evening, that by noon tomorrow some loading will be resumed unless some fresh complication arises.

To Meet Crothers

Winnipeg, Oct. 8.—W. B. Langan, J. C. Gage, David Horn, R. R. Dobell and Manager Murray, of the United Farmers' League, have left for Fort William, where they will meet Hon. T. W. Crothers as a deputation from the Grain exchange.

ADVANCE TO BRITAIN

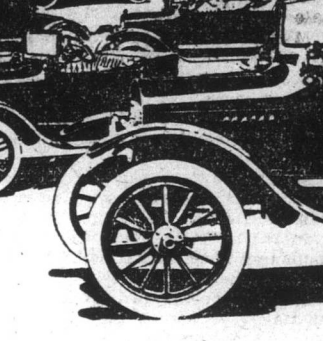
Washington, Oct. 8.—Another credit of \$15,000,000 was advanced today to Great Britain by the United States government.

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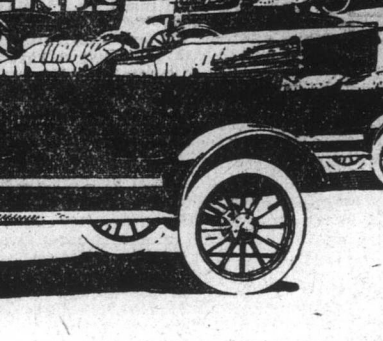
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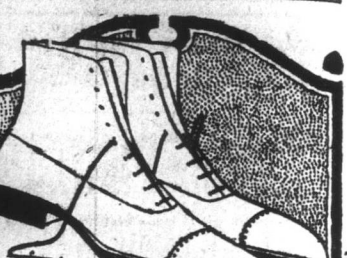
