


It appears that the situation in the Ruhr district is improving. The German Government is no longer able to pay the artisans for refusing to work; the owners of the industries are in a position to pay them for working, and France is trying to make the conditions agreeable for the employers. Proprietors and managers who banished or imprisoned for their interference with the French operaions have be to return to their places of business, with the understanding that they will co-operate with the French in restor-

If this understanding can be car ried out, France will receive a certain share of the products. The quantity left for the profit of the operator may still be considerable. least there will be enough to provide an adequate wage fund for workmen whose families are destitute. More over, there will again be a supply of raw materials for German industries

lsewhere.

Hope is held out that if the German employers and workers resume their former activities and make their fair contributions to France, the main body of the army will disappear, so that the occupation will be invisible, and the residents will no longer work under the menace of foreign soldiers. It may be that this prospect is too hopeful, but it ought to be true. For the establishment of order and peaceful industry in the Ruhr district would be a long step in the way of a new and improved international situation.

If industrial activites and orderly conditions are restored in the Ruhr district Berlin will have very little to do wth it. The industrial magnates in the district will be mainly responsible for the change. is a question of business.
