John Richardson, of Warwick township,

kicked on the head, leaving it open an
inch deep and four inches long. He is im-
proving.

On Sunday a 2-year-old son of Wm.
Husson, Guelph, was observed by his
mother to fall feet first into a well. He
was rescued by his father. Moral—Never
allow the plank of a well to remain loose.

Joseph Campman, of Walkerville, is the
possessor of some old Indian remains found
the other day in Walkerville. The remains
of a skeleton indicated a very large man
and were covered by only two feet of earth.

On Sunday Mr. Robert Edgar, turner in
the locomotive department of the G. T. R.,
St. Thomas, was badly scalped on the
shoulder and received a severe scalp wound
on the back of the head from a steam gauge
bursting.

"The stable and shed of Malcolm Johnson,
of the 6th con. of Dawn, were struck by
lightning on Thursday morning of last
week and burned to the ground, with
light tons of hay and a valuable young
horse. Loss about \$400; partially insured.

On Friday three barns belonging to Robt.
Russell, of Ballinacree, were struck with
lightning and totally consumed. They
contained the season's crops and a large
portion of his agricultural implements. The
stock was saved. Loss, \$3,000; no in-
surance.

standing to pick cherries and broke her
right arm near the wrist. The break is an
ugly one, as the bone protruded through
the skin, but the little patient bears her
trouble bravely and is getting on nicely.

Ald. Hogarth has resigned his seat in the
Stratford City Council, and has left for
Dakota, where he assumes the position of
general manager of the flax and fiber works
of Messrs. Stuart, Pritch & Co., of Phila-
delphia. His headquarters will be at
Marion, South Dakota, but his family will
not remove there until next year.

While Rev. J. C. Smith, of Guelph, and
Mr. McKinnon, of Port Elgin, were driving
on their way to visit friends in Underwood
on Friday their horse took fright and ran
on the occupants, completely upsetting the buggy
on the occupants, who had a miraculous
escape from instant death. They fortunately
escaped with bruises of little or no conse-
quence.

Geo. Clarke, a key maker at Bell & Co.'s,
Guelph, has had enough jumping from
trains while in motion. On Saturday
night, in that city, he misjudged his loca-
tion while leaping from a C. P. R. train
and found himself struggling in mid-air,
the water of which was six feet deep. He
reached terra firma in safety.

Chris. Lucas, a colored man, and a white
boy named Stewart have been arrested on
a charge of stealing a gang plow from J. B.
J. B. Stothers, a North Dorchester farmer.
They are also suspected of having stolen a
pair of wheels from a reaper, the property
of a neighbor of Mr. Stothers. The prisoners
were bailed till Saturday next.

A very serious and painful accident be-
fell the 4-year-old son of David Cole, of
Walkerville, on Saturday. The young lad
was playing on top of a lumber pile in H.
Walker & Sons' yard when he tripped and
fell off the pile to the ground. One of his
arms was badly fractured, the bone at the
elbow protruding as of the flesh.

Mrs. Charlotte Ducey, widow of Zedekiah
Dance, died at the residence of her young
son, J. C. Ducey, ex-M.P.P., South
Dorchester, on Monday, at the advanced
age of 80 years, 6 months and 14 days.

Mrs. Dance was the eldest resident in the
township, having settled on the farm on
which she died in 183, and had lived on it
continuously ever since, or 55 years.

urday. A release came and he passed away
very quickly. He was studying for an
episcopal ministry, and was filling the pulpit
of the Second Baptist Church, Woodstock,
during the summer.

At Owen Sound on Saturday Ira Peters,
a 14-year-old stable boy in the employ of
Dr. Allan Cameron, nearly put an end to
his life by hanging himself from the end of
a strap. It was three hours before he re-
gained consciousness. He would give no
reason for his rash act. By some it was
thought that the boy had been experi-
menting to see how long he could remain in the
position and overrid the thing, while others
think it was a deliberate attempt at sui-
cide.

Mrs. Thomas B. Lett, jun., living near
Eganville, went out to do some work in a
garden the other day, leaving her 1-year-
old baby in the house. The child made a
peculiar noise and the mother went in, where
she was horrified to see the youngster with a
low lead hold of the reptile with one hand,
while with the other he was feeding his
snakeishness some bread. The horror-
stricken mother, summoning her daughter
to her aid, killed the snake with a hoe.

George Francis, a farmer close to the Air
Line, near Tilsonburg, had his barn burned
five nights ago. Loss, \$1,000; insured
for \$800. John Moore, aged 60 years, who
had served two years in Kingston, was
arrested on Monday on a charge of
suspicion of having set fire to the barn.

He admitted having slept in them, but pre-
tended to have been crazy. Constable Fox,
of Tilsonburg, arrested him and he was
brought before P. M. Haro and Mayor
Scott, of Tilsonburg, and remanded.

Fires have occurred in various places in
the work of an incendiary, that the Mayor
issued a proclamation on Monday offering a
reward of \$500 for information that will
lead to the apprehension of the guilty
parties. The immediate causes for issuing
the proclamation were two incendiary fires
which broke out on Sunday night. The
first originated in a lumber pile in Robert
McKenzie's lumber yard at 1 o'clock, and
the second in a house at James King and
Mr. Robert Turner. One of the houses was
found to be saturated with coal oil. The
incendiary, evidently determined not to be
tricked, ignited a wood pile in the rear
of the Presbyterian Church. This time
the fire alarm was given, and the firemen
put out the flames before any damage
was done.

of all. In the interval between sunset and
moonrise the boys light a camp fire, and it
is as pretty a sight as anyone would want
to see the circle of happy faces gather
around and talk over the doings of the day.

To anyone coming towards the camp the
picture would be about as follows: In
front of him, a small open space with the
dark shadows of the trees on the left two
white tents, and on his right the camp
stove with its various accompani-
