An Exciting Encyclical.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 17.—In an encyclical the Synod of the Greek Church declares that the Turkish Government's breach of privilege of the church have overthrown the secular statu quo, interfered with questions purely dogmatic, destroyed the lawful action of the Synod, caused the resignation of the Patriarch and placed the synod in a position in which it no longer has a function. The encyclical causes intense excitement.

Paris, Oct. 17.—Dillon and O'Brien will remain here for eight days, when they will proceed to Havre and take passage for New York. Dillon and O'Brien expect to embark for the United States on Oct. 25. They will remain in America four months and will return to Ireland and surrender themselves. Dillon expects to raise £100,000 in America, and expects a year's imprisonment when he returns. Regarding the propriety of his fight, Dillon said: "I made special inquiry in regard to the question of keeping good faith, and was satisfied we were no more under obligation to keep within bounds than a prisoner is to remain in prison. We were watched and dogged everywhere we went, and the police had warrants for our arrest three days beforehand." He thought the British Government would be ashamed to ask for their extradition. He regarded his arrest as a scheme to prevent him going to America to lay the case of the Irish people before the American people.

The Climate of Sierra Leone is Not Suited for Them.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—The British Minister has transmitted to the Department of State a letter from the Governor of Sierra Leone, inclosing a report from the colonial Burgeon at Freetown, Dr. D. Palmer Ross, relative to the case of the nine American missionaries at that place.
