Stratford, Sept. 17.—While crossing the Buffalo & Goderich Railroad yesterday morning at the Nelson street crossing, Mrs. Thomas Duncan, who lives on Railway avene, was struck by the engine of the rassenger train and received injuries about the head which are likely to prove fatal. The engineer, James Green, says that he saw her approaching the track but supposed she would stop before she reached it, as the train could be plainly seen from the crossing and the bell had been ringing for some time. Almost before he was aware of it, however, she had stepped directly in ront of the engine, the buffer beam of which struck her and threw her a distance of about fifteen feet. She is about 54 years of age and came to this city with her husband from Hamilton at the time of the removal of the G. T. R. shops, of which her husband is an employe. At present she is lying in an unconscious condition, her skull being fractured near the left temple.

The Government has set apart \$100,000 for relief measures, and has asked the Bank of Spain to grant credits to the governors of the suffering provinces. The Queen has given \$40,000 to start a relief fund.

MADRID, Sept. 17.—The Governor of Jaen, capital of the Province of the same name, tolegraphs that the whole commune of Aubeda is submerged; that the damage is enormous, and that there has been considerable loss of life.

An estimate of the damage to property in and about Consuegra places the losses at \$2,500,000, not including the money and valuables buried everywhere in the ruins.

An eyewitness describing the scene at Consuegra says: The river rose by leaps and leaps, carrying everything before it with resistless fury. It was an awful sight to see the now thoroughly terrified people climbing to the roof of their houses, and shricking vainly for help, which it was impossible any longer to render. The houses collapsed one after another, and were swallowed up in the seathing torrent. Daybreak saw hundreds of men and beasts struggling in the water, clinging in despair to wreckage and whirled along so

DOMINION ELECTIONS.

Trying to Amend a Very Faulty Act of Necessity for Getting Rid of the Partisan Returning Officer.

Three Thousand Persons Perish in Consugura Atone—The Rice Crop Destroyed by a Terriblo
Storm.

MADRID, Sept. 16.—Accounts from Consugura are appalling in the extreme. The town is a heap of rains, surrounded by a vast expanse of water, leaving visible here and there tree tops, chimneys and floating wreckage of all kinds. It is estimated 5,000 head of horses and stock have been 5 drowned. The flood at Almeria has plunged the city into absolute darkness, destroying the gas works and electric light establishments.

The River Andaray has overflowed its banks and converted the valley into a vast lake. Carts are kept going from house to house collecting the dead. Survivors give to the rush of the torrents. The bodies of 60 persons were found in a public hall, where they had been overtaken by the flood in the midst of a wedding feast. A heavy rainfell Friday and Saturday, swelling the mountain torrents that poured into Amarguilla. The flood destroyed four stone in tridges and twenty mills, besides an enormous number of houses. Wreckage and corpses were carried 40 miles.

He wanted to call the attention of the House to some of the remarks of honorable gentlemen opposite. He specified notably the member for Brockville. That gentleman had said that to revert to the old system, under which this duty was entrusted to sheriffs, was pre-eminently objectionable, because those officers might possibly be partisans. Therefore Mr. Wood appeared to approve of a system whereby these officers must be partisans, must be appointed by the Ministerial candidate of the day. He had no doubt that the people would be well content to have a returning officer appointed by neither political party. The matter of appointing a returning officer might be vested in a board consisting of one official nominated by the Poorvincial Government, and one official nominated by the Provincial Government, and one official nominated by the people.
