

MR. JOHN ANDRAS ON "AS YOU

LIKE IT." To say that Mr. Andras gave no or-dinary pleasure to the large gathering assembled in the "Y" rooms last evening to hear his lecture on Shakespeare's 'As You Like It" would be no exaggeration. After a few appropriate remarks from the Rev. G. B. Sage, who occupied the chair, the lecturer proceeded with his subject. After Mr. Andras had shown that the play was probably written at the commencement of the sixteenth century, he went on to say that "the great poet was at home in and familiar with court and camp, palace and cottage, crowded street and merry hostelry, but no scene does he paint and adorn with loving hand as the woodland-the merry greenwood; he bears himself nobly and grandly in court and camp; he is full of jovial merriment in the safe seclusion of the oak-paneled inn room, but his heart and breast expand to the fuller, freer life in the long vistas of stately oak and beech, which spread their broad and hospitable shade over mossy banks and flowery dell." The lecturer then read the most noteworthy portions of the play, the humorous passages being rendered with great chic, the audience indulging in roars of laughter. In closing Mr. Andras remarked that the picture presented in the play of pastoral purity and kindliness is strongly contrasted with the injustice, self-seek-ing and oppression which prevail in the crowded centers of the work-a-day world. In the forest one is subject to only those adversities which are part of the inevitable conditions of nature and are God's sending, but in the town there are also the evils and troubles of man's creation. "God made the coun-
