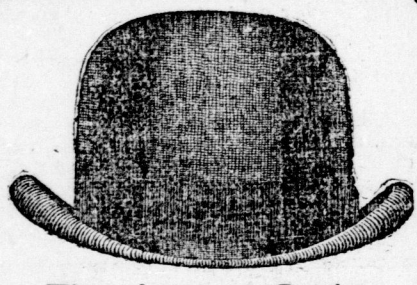

—The street railway company have a gang of men at work removing the snow and ice from the south side of Dundas street, where the rays of the sun cannot reach.

—At a special sitting of the Kent County Court, held in Chatham, Mr. Alex. Stuart, clerk, had the will of the late Singleton Gibb, of Bothwell, proved, in solvent form. The estate was valued at \$30,000.

—London Lodge, K. of P., will meet for the last time in their South London Lodge room on the first Wednesday of next month. They will hold their meetings in Mizpah Hall, corner of Dundas and Richmond, thereafter.

—No weekly sitting of the High Court will be held in this city on Tuesday next.

—Rev. W. M. Lawrence, D.D., pastor of the Second Baptist Church, Chicago, will occupy the pulpit of the Talbot Street Church tomorrow. Mr. Lawrence is a preacher of marked ability and eloquence.

—Mr. H. Richardson, traveling agent of the People's Building and Loan Association, of London, Ont., has established a local branch at Florence, with Walter Drew as secretary-treasurer, and an infirmary and doctor's office.

—The management of the International Entertainment, who appear at the Grand Opera House here on the 28th inst., have secured from Mr. Burnett a Heintzman & Co. grand piano for use at their entertainment.

—The Detroit commissioners who have in hand the establishing of an aviary on Belle Isle have purchased from Dr. Niven, of this city, the well known poultry connoisseur, several pheasants, including Golden, Silver, English, Lady Amherst, and a number of tame quail.

—The committee on plans for the Dundas Street Central Methodist Church have received a large number of beautiful designs. Five or six of them are very fine models of church architecture, and the combined wisdom of the officials will be fully taxed in selecting one that may be considered the best in all respects for their new building.

—The London Symphony Orchestra concert at Duncombe's Opera House on Thursday evening, March 23, promises to be an event of great musical interest.

—Mr. Angus, who plays the leading first violin, will play two solo numbers. This young man has not yet attained his 20th birthday, but is second to none in Canada as a brilliant soloist.—St. Thomas Times.

—At the meeting of Kingston Presbytery the following were chosen as delegates to attend the next meeting of the General Assembly, to be held in London in June: Revs. J. Cumberland, J. L. George, J. Moore, S. Chisholm, E. L. Lang, Principal Galt, H. Gracey, S. Houston and J. Binnie, Elders W. P. Hudson, T. Hume, W. McIntosh, R. Urquhart, Prof. Dyde, J. Adams, Ogden Hinch, J. O'Hara and Geo. Gillies.

—It is a peculiar fact that Rev. E. B. Lanecey, pastor of the burned Dundas Street Church, London, when preaching the anniversary sermon in the First Methodist Church here a Sunday or two ago should have appealed to the congregation for a larger contribution to the missionary fund, as Queen's Avenue and Dundas Street, London, could not come up to their usual large offering on account of their churches being destroyed. Now those to whom he appealed are in the same position.—St. Thomas Times.

—The Local Christian Endeavor Union of Talbot Street Baptist Church expected to bring Rev. Mr. Kimball to this city to deliver a lecture on the famous battle of Gettysburg next week, but have had to postpone it, as the church over which Mr. Kimball is pastor is holding special services. The proceeds of the lecture were to be devoted toward the new Y. M. C. A. building.

—Mr. Kimball was a captain in the Eighteenth New Hampshire Regiment five the civil war, and was killed at the battle of Gettysburg. He was the last to be remembered as the speaker at the last meeting conducted by the Y. M. C. A. in the Opera House.

—A regular meeting of the Hospital Trust was held at the hospital yesterday afternoon. The superintendent's reports of admission and discharges were received. There are at present 71 patients in the institution. Drs. Campbell, Watson, Tensdall and Bayly were appointed to serve on the active staff during the present summer. Applications for positions on the nursing staff were received from Lella Nova Perkins, Hyde Park, and Clara Kilbourn, of Kilworth. The trustees spent considerable time in discussing the proposed new addition to the hospital. Adjourned for two weeks.

WILL TAKE A PLEBISCITE.
The board of trustees of the Queen's Avenue Methodist Church held a meeting in Salvation Hall yesterday afternoon at which the matter of a church site, which was so vigorously debated by the members of the congregation the night before, was taken up. It was decided that in view of the difference of opinion prevailing a plebiscite of the members and pew holders would be prepared.
