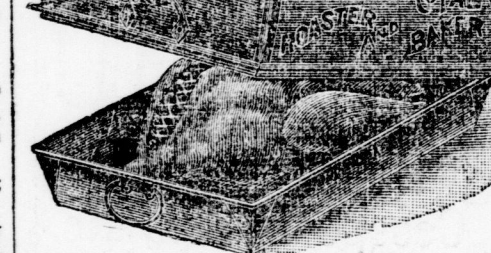

be asked to say when the proceeds will
be placed at the disposal of the board. On

chairman was instructed to enter into an
agreement with Mr. Dignan for the pur-
chase of his lot of 100 feet on Queen's
avenue, and 80 feet on Wellington street,

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—The annual meeting of the Young
Men's Christian Association, which was
called for last night, has been indefinitely

Costly Riding.

Yesterday afternoon, says a Windsor
dispatch, Peter F. Murphy, Peter Moore
and Wm. Brown, we dismounted at the
Ontario Natural Gas Company, and shortly
after boarded a train at Kingsville to come
to Walkerville. They neglected to provide
themselves with tickets, and when they re-
fused to pay fare Conductor Whitley
stopped the train and put them off.
After the train started again they
jumped on and got in a box
car, but were seen by the conductor,
who telegraphed to Superintendent Wool-
lart from Harrow. As soon as the message
was received a special train was sent out
with Officer Weston on board, who arrested
the men at the junction and had them
brought to Walkerville. Magistrate Bart-
lett was sent for, and inside of two hours
the men had been tried, convicted and
sentenced to pay a fine of \$8 each. The
cost came high, but the Walkers want it
understood that there is to be no monkey
work on that road.

last night, with Chairman Wm. Jones,
Commissioner Cowan, Engineer Moore,
Secretary Ellwood and Inspectors Platt and
Piastov present. Mrs. Bartlett, 724 Mait-
land street, complained of insufficient
hydrant pressure. The engineer will put
in a new service if necessary. E. F. John-
ston, London West, applied for a service.
The request was granted on condition that
Mr. Johnston supply an agreement satis-
factory to the engineer. Petitions for mains
from H. Payne, Duchesse avenue, E. H.
Cowan, Wellington street, and Mrs. M.
Bruce, Chesapeake street, were referred to
Engineer Moore to report. The engineer
recommended that Portland cement mortar
be used as the foundation of the new
pumping station instead of lime mortar,
owing to the wet condition of the soil.
This suggestion will be acted upon. The
cost will be \$90. A new veranda will be
placed on the north side of the Springbank
Hotel at a cost of \$150.

Weeks of practice and preparation cul-

a professional smoothness and finish, due in

place at the piano, as of yore, she was
greeted with a hearty round of applause,
supplemented by several beautiful floral
tributes from friends. She handled the in-
strument and conducted the orchestra with
all her former brilliancy and tone. The
chorus was carefully picked and well
balanced, and managed the crescendo with
plenty of vigor. The voices were
clear and fresh, advantages which
amateurs have over traveling troupes,
who are often tired and unenthusiastic.
The melody and mirth of Offenbach's tun-
eful opera were therefore most ably in-
terpreted last night. Praise must be accorded
the management for the sumptuous costum-
ing of the piece, which must have entailed
trouble and expense. The
dresses were very pretty and tasteful.

The principals acquitted themselves
famously. Of course Mrs. A. D. Holman
as the Duchess was the bright par-
ticular star and shone resplendent.
Her dramatic treatment of the role was
delightfully crisp and artistic, while her
voice, trained in the best schools of opera,
took the highest notes with apparent ease
and sustaining power. Her admirers sent
her a number of bouquets. Mrs. Holman's
dresses were rich and unique in pattern.
As Vanda, Miss Eva Roche looked de-
monstrably charming, and her unaffected
manner won many favorable comments and
a couple of handsome presents from the
greenhouse. Mr. Holman had been in bed
all day from a severe cold, and went
bravely through his part while really ill.
Few would have suspected it, however,
for despite his hoarseness he played with
his usual felicity and shared the honors
with his wife. Mr. J. M. Daly, in the im-
portant role of Fritz, acted with commend-
able sang froid and self-possession and sang
with much spirit. His cleverness
surprised his friends. Mr. William
Thorne, an old favorite, showed his
stage aptitude again by his humorous
conception of Baron Puck, and Mr. Alf
Wicks as the insipid Prince Paul was the
best of a thankless part. Ald. Coe, who was
a funny Baron Grog, sang to a catchy tune a
topical song which told of the visit of Tom
Essey and himself to the ladies' club in the
instance of an irate father, whose daughters
they had escorted home one night, and also
revealed the secret that the aldermen
were drinking toddy in a neighboring
saloon when the council quorum on the
license reduction bylaw disappeared. Mr.
W. H. Irvine made a capital aide-de-camp
and Master Holman beat the kettle drum
in a way that proved him a chip of the old
block. The maids of honor—Miss Katie
McLaughlin, Miss Blanch Pigott, Miss
Pauline Hennevey and Miss Nellie Deacon—
each rendered a solo. Individually and
collectively the entire company are entitled
to eulogy, and it is gratifying to know
the performance was a financial as well as
an artistic success. This will encourage
them for the future when added experience
if that is possible.
