BLOCKADE OF CRETE ORDERED. Rome, March 16 .- It is semi-officially stated here that all of the foreign admirals have now received orders to blockade the Island of Crete. But, it is added, the blockade of Greece would only occur if the Cretan blockade proves inadequate. The Greek fleet shire, S.
