A GOOD START.

The Hams were up against the real thing at Tecumseh Park yesterday, and will have to take a brace or the Cocks will land another championship in a walk. It was the opening game of the Canadian championship series, and the visitors were never in it. They have the reputation of being the hardest hitters on earth, but Kestel made them look like a lot of schoolboys. The Hams, however, did not have hardly a square shake, as they only arrived here a couple of hours ahead of the game, and were not in good shape. Some 400 enthusiasts saw the Hams go down to defeat. Errors were decidedly plentiful. The game opened up lively. Sheehan hit a hot one to Kestel, but the ball reached the initial bag ahead of him. Cockman put a nice pop fly into Mohler's hands. McKevitt hit safe to center, but was forced at second by McKevitt.

Radcliffe started the fireworks for the home team, driving the ball at Cockman. The latter failed to hold it. Mohler sacrificed, Hemphill followed with a nice drive to third, which McKevitt misjudged, and after scoring the ball made a wild throw to the plate. Radcliffe came home, but Hemphill was caught a couple of feet from the plate. Duran made a pretty throw in, returning the ball to Conwell. Hart flew out. In the second, Bradford issued two passes, and these coupled with two singles, a sacrifice hit and an error, gave the home team three tallies. The Hams' first run was given them in the third by Cope, who fumbled Sheehan's hit, and on scooping in McKevitt's grounder, made a wild throw to first, the ball going about 20 feet over Hart's head. Sheehan scored, but McKevitt was caught at the plate on a pretty return by Hemphill. In the fifth Hemphill opened with a long drive for three bases, and later came in on a wild pitch. In the seventh and eighth, the locals continued to score. McKevitt scored the visitors' last tally on a homer to left.

AT NEW HAMBURG.
New Hamburg, Ont., July 10.—The annual three days' meeting of the New Hamburg Trotting Association made a favorable start here today. There were nearly 30 entries on today's programme. The 2:40 pace and trot—12 entries, 9 starters—took seven heats to decide, some of them being very close and exciting. Guineas and John Storm were favorites, showing up well, and were backed for winners, but Dan C took the last three heats in much slower time than the first four were won in. In the 2:20 pace and 2:18 trot there were nine entries, and eight started. Harold fell at the start in the first heat and cut his leg so badly that he was drawn. It took six heats to decide this race. Maggie Usher, a local horse, won after some very close finishes, with Harold H. finishing second money.

Annie Gould also showed up well. In the half-mile running, nine entries, seven starters. Satin Finish, in the first heat, had the misfortune to break his right front leg at the fellock, and had to be shot. The owner of this horse, Mr. L. G. Bennett, Port Hope, Ont., is also owner of Harold, which met an accident in the 2:20 class. Laurentian, with its track record, was favorite, and won out against Tally Ho. RIFLE.
London, July 10.—Magnificent weather favored the National Rifle Association competitors at Bisley today, the match rifle experts again having the programme to themselves. The Bass competition was won by Color-Sergt. Pooten, of Liverpool, with a total of 135; no Canadians competed. The Half-ford memorial challenge cup was won by Caldwell, of the Ulster Rifles.

A Toronto man, Sergt. J. McVittie, of the 48th Highlanders, shooting today in the Gregory match, which opened yesterday and finishes next Monday, got his shots within the inner circle each time he shot, making 35 points. The distance was 200 yards.
In the S. R. Association cup match, Lieut. H. C. Blair, of the 78th Battalion, made 34 points at 600 yards, with seven shots. He made a possible in the S. R. rifle, unaided competition at 600 yards, seven shots. In this match, which is open to the National Rifle Association only, the contestants are nominated by ladies.

WEEL.
Boston, July 10.—Eleven world's records were broken by Jimmie Nelson, of Chicago, at the golden wheel six-day medal race at Charles River Park, which began last night. Nelson covered 66 miles 30 feet during two hours riding. Four men started, the other three being Charles R. Miller, of Chicago; Burns W. Pierce, of Nova Scotia; and William C. Stinson, of Cambridge. Nelson's pace was terrific throughout the entire two hours, and he was over a mile ahead of Stinson at the end of the 30th lap. Nelson made 63 miles 3/4-lap; Miller 60 miles 3/4-lap, and Stinson, 57 miles 1/4-lap.
