CHOLERA'S RAVAGES.

Advices from Kharbin, Manchuria, say that inhabitants who are able to men arrayed in vari-colored uniforms do so are fleeing from the town in consequence of the cholera epidemic. Chinamen are dying like flies, many dying even while at work on the quays, on the docks or in workshops. Deaths also among the Russians are heavy. The average daily mortality at Kharbin and in its vicinity is from 130 to 150. Railway officials are quitting their posts without awaiting their pay, and those who consent to remain demand treble their usual salaries.
