Robbed His Employer, and to Hide His Crime Killed Her and Her Daughters.

Philadelphia, May 28.-William Harmon Lane (colored) was hanged here yesterday morning.

The crime for which Lane paid the death penalty was particularly atrocious. On the morning of April 1 he shot and killed Ella Jarden, by whom he was employed as a servant, and her two daughters, Madeleine, aged 12, and Eloise, aged 7 years.

Lane had stolen money from his employer, and, fearing the consequences of his thefts, he deliberately shot the woman and her younger daughter in an upper room of their home, and then called the elder child from the street, where she had been playing and shot

where she had been playing, and shot and killed her.

After the shooting Lane escaped to Camden, N. J., but was arrested a few hours later in the railroad station in that city. He confessed his crime, and after a formal hearing he was sentenced to death. PROHIBITIONIST MEETING

Barroom Declared To Be the Enemy of the Home.

Addresses by Mr. Daly, the Black Knight and Others.

A mass meeting in the interests of Mr. F. W. Daly, prohibitionist candidate, was held last night in the East End Hall. There was a fairly large attendance, composed chiefly of women. The chairman was Mr. John Potts, and with him on the platform were, besides the candidates, Rev. J. H. Hector, Rev. J. W. Holmes, Rev. George Jackson, ex-Ald. Wray and W. B. Mills. Mr. Daly, the candidate, delivered a

very brief address, and was followed by Mr. Hector, the Black Knight. The Black Knight made a strong appeal for the support of Mr. Daly. declared the battle to be between the barrooms and the homes of the land. The Conservative and Liberal candidates had, he contended, refused to say where they stood on the prohibi-tion question, while Mr. Daly, a business man, was out and out against the bars. Free Press Refuses Refutation of Beck Charge.

ABSOLUTELY NO TRUTH IN IT

"The Whole Charge Is False and Malicious," the Liberal Candidate Savs.

#### MARKET IN AUSTRALIA FOR CANADIAN BUTTER

Big Advance in Prices in the Antipodean Commonwealth.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, May 28.-In a report to the department of trade and commerce. J. S. Larke says that there is a big increase in Australia in the prices of wheat flour, butter and cheese. This is due to the drought and heavy export of grain to Britain. The last crop was about 10,000,000 bushels short of the estimate, and the next crop will not be sufficient to meet the home supply. Flour has risen from \$30 and \$32 per ton to \$42 and \$47. Wheat rose from 48 cents to 96 cents and \$1 10 per bushel. There were also big increases in butter, cheese, bacon

and lard.

Mr. Larke says this gives promise of good trade with Canada. He says that he had inquiry for 50 tons of butter per month for three months, for which 25 cents per pound can be had on board ship at Vancouver, B. C. The Australian duty on butter and cheese is 6 cents per pound.
