A COLORED MAN HANGED

Suifered the Death Penalty for a Triple Murder.

Robbed His Employer, and to Hide His Crime Killed Her and Her Daughters.

Philadelphia, May 28.—William Harmon Lane (colored) was hanged yesterday morning.

The crime for which Lane paid the death penalty was particularly atrocious. On the morning of April 1 he shot and killed Ella Jarden, by whom he was employed as a servant, and her two daughters, Madeline, aged 12, and Eloise, aged 7 years.

Lane had stolen money from his employer, and, fearing the consequences of his thefts, he deliberately shot the woman and her younger daughter in an upper room of their home, and then called the elder child from the street, where she had been playing, and shot and killed her.

After the shooting Lane escaped to Camden, N. J., but was arrested a few hours later in the railroad station in that city. He confessed his crime, and after a formal hearing he was sentenced to death. In less than two months after the commission of the crime the man was executed.

ROYAL SOCIETY OF CANADA.

Toronto, May 28.—The annual meeting of the Royal Society of Canada began yesterday at the university, Principal London occupying the chair, and 50 members were present.

Great present. The president, Dr. F. J. G. Fitcher, in his address, expressed that Sir John Bourinot, the secretary, was unable to be present through illness. Dr. Fitcher is lecturing in place. The annual report referred to touching terms to the death of Principal Galt. Among the recommendations contained in the report were the following: That everything possible should be done to preserve historical places in Canada; that systematic ethnological work should be carried on in the Dominion; that the Canadian people co-operate with the United States and Mexico in determining the 8th meridian; and that the operations of the government marine station of biology be increased and increased. Pleasure was expressed that the movement to erect a monument to Gen. Montgomery in Quebec had been dropped.

Phariseism Exposed.

Mr. Beck, stand up!

What have you to say for yourself, Mr. Beck?

You, Mr. Beck, have been posing as the exemplary candidate—the perfect man—the paragon of political honesty, for many conduct and fair play.

What did you profess at the nominations? You put yourself on a lofty moral pedestal. You assumed a tone of superior virtue. You asked that personalities be eschewed. You wanted no mud-flinging. You thought the candidates should be friends. You hoped that one would not asperse the other. In your unctuous rectitude you expressed a desire to lift this contest to a

higher plane. You pleaded for a gentleman's campaign.

Such was Adam Beck, the poseur! Now for Adam Beck, the politician:

You must admit, Mr. Beck, that Col. Leys had given you no cause for offense. He had not sought to quarrel with you. He had not attacked you; he had not scandalized you; he had not even criticised you; but had addressed himself to wider issues. But what of your conduct, Mr. Beck? Have you lived up to your self-righteous profession?

In West London last night you slandered Col. Leys. You gave currency to a libelous statement, accusing him of breaking the laws of the Province, and suborning officials to protect him from prosecution.

But we must not despise the enemy, even though we do know him, and know his weakness. Overconfidence is often dangerous. We must take no risks. Close up the ranks. Stand fast. Let every Liberal be prepared to give his time and his labor for the few hours required. The work is worth doing, and worth doing well. Our country's interests, and our own interests, are best served by every Liberal doing his duty as a Liberal should. Ross is a statesman to rally round. Leys is a local leader of whom we need not be ashamed. Liberalism means equal rights; justice for all; honest government; and a prosperous Province. Leaders and cause alike deserve the best we have—the best we can give.

Success is assured, if each man does his part. Failure can only result from neglect and indifference. Close up the ranks.

Close Up the Ranks.

One day more, and the campaign will end. The last desperate charge of the hungry horde will be made. For years successive Liberal Governments have remained strongly entrenched in the esteem and confidence of the people of Ontario. Quadriennial assaults have surged against them, only to be beaten back like the surf that breaks against the rocks. Today the Government stands as firmly as it ever stood, "broad-based upon the people's will."

And the charge tomorrow will be as vain as those that have gone before.

The forces under Mr. Whitney are clamorous and boastful. As in a Chinese army, there is a great beating of drums and tom-toms; a fearful squealing of penny whistles; an offensive discharge of odoriferous missiles. But the walls are not going to tumble

But they must announce beforehand that the Liberals will not fight fair; so that when defeat comes they may have an explanation and an excuse ready to hand.

EAST LONDON WILL STAND BY LEYS

TILL THE LAST BALLOT IS COUNTED!

Liberal Candidate Addressed an Enthusiastic Gathering of Electors in Jubilee Rink Last Night.

The Cold Weather Did Not Damp Enthusiasm of the Audience.

MR. BECK'S FUTILE ATTACKS

The Issues Discussed by Mr. Charles Hyman, M.P., Geo. C. Gibbons, K.C., and Others.

The meeting held in the interests of Col. Leys at Jubilee Rink last night proved a model one in every respect save one, and that was in the matter of weather, a feature which not even the most enthusiastic supporter of the popular candidate could well attempt to regulate. "Short, sharp and snappy" will serve as an apt description of the proceedings. Despite the fact that the temperature was painfully near the freezing point, there was a surprisingly large attendance. The lowness of the thermometer found no corresponding depression in the spirits of Col. Leys' supporters. Their enthusiasm

was spontaneous, and it was an angry that East London would speak in no uncertain tones at the polls, in favor of the continuance of a good government at Toronto and efficient representation for London. It was exactly 65 minutes from the time Chairman Welford rose to call the meeting to order till the closing cheers for King and candidate were given. Those present, however, have seldom spent a more profitable hour, for they heard the questions of the campaign discussed clearly and clearly. Mr. C. S. Hyman, after contrasting the management of Ontario's affairs with that of her sister provinces and neighboring states—the comparison being always in Ontario's favor—turned his attention to Mr. Beck's East London address, and, avoiding personalities, showed the weak points of that gentleman's arguments. Col. Leys followed with one of his characteristic speeches, full of force, fire and good logic. Mr. Geo. C. Gibbons and Major Hume Cronyn gave brief and inspiring addresses. The meeting was one which could not fail to have a good effect upon Col. Leys' candidature, and its results should be apparent in the return from East London on Thursday night.

Mr. Jesse Welford made an acceptable chairman. After a few brief remarks he called upon C. S. Hyman, M.P., for the opening speech.

Mr. C. S. Hyman.

Mr. Hyman, on arising, said that the question involved in the coming contest was not one of personalities of candidates, but also one of leaders. On one hand was Mr. Geo. W. Ross, the able successor of a brilliant line of premiers; on the other was Mr. Whitney, an untitled man. The electors must choose which was to hold the reins of power for four years.

Mr. Hyman, before referring to Ontario affairs, spoke of the political conditions in the other provinces of the Dominion. In Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island the Liberals hold office and are conducting the affairs of these provinces in an efficient manner. In Quebec, which Conservative rule brought to the verge of ruin, Liberals are in power, and the province is prosperous.

In Manitoba, the only province in the Dominion under Conservative rule, the government has

and at the next election only a vestige of its followers will be returned. Mr. Hyman contrasted the present government of Ontario with the government of the United States, and showed the disparity in favor of Ontario. The policy of the Ontario Government has not been to hoard up money. Since taking office, the government has given back to the municipalities

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
