ADRIFT ALL WINTER

Newfoundland Fishermen Imprisoned by Ice Floes Many Months.
St. John's, Nfld., June 2.—The American fishing cutter, A. M. Nicholson, of Bucksport, Maine, adrift in an ice floe all winter, sailed safely into Bonne Bay yesterday. The Nicholson's crew abandoned her Jan. 29, and made their way over the ice to the mainland near the bay of St. George. Five Newfoundland fishermen boarded the vessel April 4, 40 miles from Bonne Bay, and after a trying experience of 50 days, four of the fishermen brought her into port. The fifth, having grown

weary of the close confinement, left the vessel May 29 and walked across the ice towards Portland Creek. He has not been heard from since. The fishermen had very little to eat. They lived most of the time on bread and butter and flour boiled in a ventilator cover, the only thing left on board that could be utilized for cooking. They arrived in Bonne Bay weak and exhausted.

Tells Temperance People to Take What Is Offered

Rev. Dr. Chown Deals With the Situation in Ontario.

The Government Commended for Present Enforcement of Law.

Conference Receives Educational Reports and Also a Report of Superannuation Fund.

"If both candidates are satisfactory, and one party has committed itself to something for the temperance people, then I shall vote for the party that has so committed itself."

"There is a rumor that Premier Ross intends to banish the bars; there may be something in that—I am in favor of banishing the bars—it will give us some definite advance, but we ask for something that is practical."

Such was in part the position taken in regard to the present political situation in Ontario in relation to the temperance question by Rev. Dr. Chown, who was asked by the last General Conference of the Methodist Church to look after temperance and moral reform. His address was before a large audience at the Dundas Center Church last evening, in connection with the London Conference now in session, and it was listened to with much interest. Dr. Chown made a decided impression and was continually applauded.

Rev. Richard Hobbs, the president-elect, occupied the chair, and declared that the liquor traffic, "this giant evil," as he called it, was doing the most harm that had been done in this country. He had been accused of extravagant talk, but it had been declared that no one could exaggerate the evil of the traffic, and he was there with an intensified antagonism and a hotter zeal.

PECULIARITY OF DIFFICULTY.

Rev. David McCamus, of Saginaw, was first called upon. He pointed out the peculiarity of the difficulty. They did not think of opposition to Sunday school or mixed work, but when they entered the field of temperance and moral reform they encountered an organized, wealthy, ubiquitous, and successful opposition. He was not long ago that a man who would speak like the president against the liquor traffic was called a crank, now the most representative laymen as well as ministers stood for temperance. The attitude of the Methodist church was a principle—to save souls. John Wesley had laid down the principle of total abstinence, and they were the successors of John Wesley. Intemperance was the prolific source of crime, debauchery, disease, pauperism and death. Sobriety, said the speaker, was the highest discipline of self-government, and the most extensive power of sobriety was the greatest business asset.

select to lead men to suicide. After referring to the arguments sometimes given for the liquor traffic, he said that the liquor traffic could not be regulated, as nothing essentially evil could be regulated.

He had proved a failure in termination was the only solution. The toleration of the liquor traffic was the greatest anachronism of the twentieth century.

PROGRESS OF A YEAR.

After a congregational hymn, Rev. Dr. Chown addressed the gathering. At the outset he said it spoke the place of the conference when they had elected as president a man who had always been outspoken against the liquor traffic. He would confine his remarks, he promised, to report what progress had been made during the past year. He had traveled 13,000 miles, and had spoken about 250 times, bringing back to the board collections amounting to \$1,512.75. From a financial point of view, he said, the year had been a success. He was coming out ahead. He was glad to speak in the banner church—a fact in temperance contributions the Dundas Center Church stood first. Referring to the passing of local option in Blenheim, he said the department of the Provincial Secretary had been true to the temperance people, and they could rest assured Blenheim would stand free from intoxicating liquors for at least three years. He had "opened the ball" at Toronto Junction, where a local option had been carried, and the liquor interests had given up hope.

In the matter of gambling at racetracks, he had feared he would run amok of the fashionable society, but by the support of all the ecclesiastics of Toronto he had been promised an amendment to the law.

He referred to the action of the Western Union Telegraph Company in refusing to carry betting intelligence, and had moved to have the G. N. W. here stop also. He had hoped that newspapers would be glad to exclude such intelligence from their columns, but the prospects for a law along that line were for the present not bright. He had had the satisfaction of seeing the Government tell a liquor dealer who had illegally obtained a license in New Ontario to shut up his place. There was a better enforcement of the law, the new chief officer receiving his appointment after the views of the temperance people had been consulted. The key to the situation, he pointed out, was to be found in wise political action.

STRAITS IN THE CASE.

Regarding the political situation in Ontario at the present time, he spoke at some length, recording his views on the matter. In the first place, he said the leader of the Conservative party had declared himself as not in favor of prohibition, and the signs were that he had not offended the liquor trade. Dr. Chown pointed strongly to the fact that if there was an election, the Conservative party would be supported by the Brewers and Licensed Victuallers' Associations. So that even if the Conservative party promised to better enforce the law, that would not avail the temperance people. The session of the Legislature had passed without any temperance sentiment being expressed by Mr. Whitney or his party. On the other hand the Liberals had not given expression to any temperance sentiment, nor kept their promises, unless it were in the improved enforcement.

As to the rumor that Premier Ross intended to banish the bars, Dr. Chown said there might be something in that—that meant Government control. If that were the case, that would raise many serious questions. Could they support such a measure? He himself preferred to banish the bars to having the liquor act. The Government stores would only number one-tenth of the number of licensed houses, and they could be gradually voted out by local option. He was in favor of banishing the bars—it would give them some definite advance—and he asked them to stand together and ask for something that was practical. With Government control it would be the liquor act, and if it did not enforce the law. Could they support a party that offered a measure of that sort? Some were saying a defeat would mean the bury-

ing of prohibition, but this argument he refuted. At the same time he did not favor the church hitching itself to any party.

DR. CHOWN'S ADVICE.

What he advised was that representatives should be chosen by the people for the sake of the great issue at stake. They should be true to their convictions, and should commit those convictions only to men upon whom they could rely. He thought it would be good policy to forgive Premier Ross if he brought something to them. That would involve certain cabinet changes, in which men who stood in the Premier's path would be retired. The Premier, Dr. Chown said, had been hating a strong breeze, and his life had been made uneasy by charges of party corruption. Hon. George E. Foster had said that from the moment he began to favor prohibition he had begun to weaken, and he had not been strong since.

If the right kind of a man was not offered by either party he would not prostitute his manhood by voting. If there was an unsatisfactory Conservative, and a satisfactory Liberal, he would vote Liberal. If both candidates were unsatisfactory, he would vote himself. The temperance question was never so serious as now, and he urged organized effort, with attention to the financial end of it.

WORK OF THE COLLEGES.

Yesterday afternoon's session of the London Conference held at the Wellington Street Methodist Church, was devoted chiefly to the reception of educational reports, among the speakers being Rev. Dr. Potts and Rev. Principal Warner, of Alma College. The latter presented the 23rd annual report of the college at St. Thomas, in which it was said that the college had experienced the best year yet. Fifty thousand dollars had been pledged, and all that would be required from the college was \$2,500. This would free the college from debt. The resolution was adopted, in which the work of the college was supported, and the speakers were thanked for the report they sent their daughters there.

Rev. Dr. Potts spoke of Alma College as having done great work. But his address was wholly upon the work of Victoria College. He presented the financial statement, which showed income during the year of \$42,216.43, and an expenditure of \$40,575.94. The assets totaled \$35,571.85, to which would be added \$75,000 for Amnesey Hall.

The report showed that during the year the enrollment and attendance of students had been the best in the history of the college, the net enrollment being 342, and the attendance on lectures over 300. Three hundred and two students had been enrolled in the classes of the faculty of arts, and 142 in those of the faculty of divinity. Of the 24 students enrolled, 25 were new students in arts, 77 students in divinity. The students in arts of the first year had numbered 88, of the graduating year 47. The number of students completing their course in divinity was 28, of whom 15 were graduates.

An advance had been taken in the unification of the university and its colleges, by the adoption of a common calendar for the colleges of Toronto and the three colleges—University, Victoria, and Trinity. This had required a complete reorganizing of the calendar of the university, making clearly distinct the relations of the university to the colleges, and giving each college its distinctive place in the calendar of the university. Of the accessories to their work, the most important had been the opening of Amnesey Hall, through the beneficence of the late Hart A. Massey and the trustees of his estate. For the accomplishment of this, Mr. Massey and Mrs. Massey-Treble had devoted large time and labor, with an ability and success which could not be better expressed in words; and the conspicuous success of the project was largely due to their valuable work and generous contributions.

The year had been an increasing one from year to year, until it now numbered over 16,000 volumes and probably a million pages. It was becoming very valuable, especially to students of Methodist and Canadian history. The successful work of Mr. Curdley in Egypt and Crete had furnished the college with a large amount of most valuable material in illustration of Biblical and classical studies. Curdley's work during the next year would probably be devoted to Palestine and Sinai. The board of regents was adopting measures for the strengthening of the staff and work in the departments of Homiletics and of English Bible. During the year important courses of lectures had been added in this direction, which would be continued and extended.

tended, and it was hoped that in a short time this department would be such as would gratify the wishes of the most ardent friends of Victoria.

MORE FUNDS WANTED.

In regard to the finances, Dr. Potts said that he would like to see \$200,000 raised for Victoria University. As to the educational work, he wanted the funds for that purpose doubled, for it there was one part that needed nursing it was the educational department. They had no right to ask any young man or woman to attend their college unless it was provided as good as any other university in the country. Victoria was the equal of University College, and occupied the same position, and he wanted it distinctly understood that the arts were taught as well as theology. The report was commended in resolution.

The report for the year of Albert College was presented by Rev. C. W. Wells, who reported an excellent year. There were 20 students last year, in addition to which there were 48 public school children who took the domestic science course. The report was also received with a recommendation for support.

Principal T. T. George, of the Mount Egin Institute, spoke of the work of the education of Indian boys and girls, the feature of which was the manual training and domestic science. A resolution, similar to the others was adopted.

Rev. William Kettlewell, secretary of the superannuation fund, gave an extensive report. The fund he said was as solid as any insurance company. In 20 years he had the average age of Methodist ministers had moved up from 60 to 68 years; in 45 years their term of service had doubled, and also the length of time they were on the fund. They were, therefore, paying four times as much as 40 years ago. There was a necessity for increased assessments of circuits and ministers. As Rev. Mr. Wells pointed out, "the report was most illuminating and heavy thanks were expressed to Mr. Kettlewell."

Rev. T. R. McNair briefly addressed the conference. He has been engaged in evangelistic work during the year, and has been instructed by the stationing committee to continue the work, which had been so successful.
