Ohio's New Executive To Be Inaugurated Under Cover. Columbus, O., Jan. 10.-For the first time

in the history of inaugural parades in Ohio, John M. Pattison, who teday is to take the oath as governor, will stand on foot-warmers in a glass cage, erected especially for him. The framework for the glass cage has

been erected. Today men are engaged in fitting in the glass. It is located in the middle of the reviewing stand, is about ten feet high, about twelve feet square inside, and has a peaked roof Mr. Pattison and his party, standing within, and fully protected from the weather by the glass, will be able to see the parade, both as it approaches and as it passes.

These precautions for the benefit of the executive-elect's health have been taken at the suggestion af Congressman Garber, who was chairman of Mr. Pattison's campaign committee. Mr. Pattison was exhausted by the strain of the campaign. Following his election he was further overwhelmed by thousands of applications for appointment. These applications came in the mail and in person, with the result that Mr. Pattison was soon completely knocked out.

With his vitality at a low ebb, he sought to recuperate in Florida, but instead of being benefited by that trip, his health was injured. He contracted malaria of the most annoying type, and the most careful nursing at his home in Milford has not served to benefit him in the least.
