RAPS TWAIN'S JOKES

Jerome Criticises American Humorist and Sunday Paper.

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 19.-Jerome K. Jerome, the English humorist who lectured before the Central High School tonight, declared that America's sense of humor was jaded and made a thrust at Mark Twain by saying he was laughed at more through a sense of duty than a sense of the ridiculous. He qualified this, however, by saying Twain was the only living represent-
