New York, June 25.—Manager Fred Clarke of the Pittsburgh Club will escape punishment by the board of directors of the National League for the criticism he recently made of league officers for ordering the protested Pittsburgh-Cincinnati game of April 23 played over. The incident is considered closed in view of Clarke's explanation. He admitted that in the heat of anger he did make some uncomplimentary remarks, but he said he did not question the honesty of the board of directors or any member of it.

BASEBALL NOTES

A manager was telling the other day how his team set four traps for Ty Cobb, that Ty blundered into every one of them, but scored a run each time. Some method in Ty's madness in running the bases, apparently.

For the "stealth" time this year, Pitcher Fred Glade was late to school on June 10. He was to have reported to New York on that date from Grand Island, Neb., but didn't. Fred may come over for the world's series—if there is one for the Yankees club.

Five big ex-leaguers are in the daily line-up of the Rochester team—Pattee, Holly, Maloney, Ganzel and Batch—which may account for that team's position in the Eastern League.

John B. Nash, who was actively connected with the Rochester club, from 1895 to 1906, was elected to the club won its only pennant, in 1899 and 1902, under Manager Al Buckenberger.

On account of the injury to Long John Anderson in the morning game on Decoration Day, Arndt has been playing first for Providence, with Rock on the second sack. Shaw is still doing brilliant work on third, a position in which he has gained increased favor from the Providence patrons of the game.

While Joe McGinnity is the principal stockholder in the Newark club, he takes his orders from Manager Wolverton, and has to toe the mark the same as the other players. When the "iron man" gets in the ruts while working Wolverton benches him in quick order, and the best of feeling prevails between them.

Bernie McCay has been secured by Mobile from Oakland, Cal. McCay was manager of Mobile when that city was in the Cotton States League and won two pennants for their team. He will be played at third base, taking Benson's place.

William Cranston, the Memphis second baseman, who is leading the Southern League in hitting at present, quits the Memphis team and announced his intention of joining independent baseball circles unless given his release. Dissatisfaction arising from being connected with a tall-end team in the pennant race is believed to be responsible for Cranston's action.

Toney, the Winchester pitching "phenom," is only 19. He stands 6 feet 1 inch and weighs 205 pounds.

ROOSEVELT GIVEN PIE
IN AFRICAN WILDS

American Missionary Writes Relatives of Entertaining Former President.

London, June 25.—The account of the gusto with which Colonel Roosevelt ate a piece of real American apple pie in the heart of Africa is given in a letter received yesterday by William C. Parsons, of 6090 Washington boulevard, Oak Park. The letter was written by a niece, Mrs. C. F. Johnston, who, with her husband, an American missionary living at Machakos, East Africa, entertained the ex-president at luncheon early in May.

Mrs. Johnston's letter has the following to say of Mr. Roosevelt as a guest:

"And now I must tell you one great piece of news. Last week we had the pleasure of entertaining Roosevelt at luncheon. After landing at Mombasa he and his party came up the country to Sir Alfred Pearce's place, which is only eight miles from us. One day we received a note saying they would like to call on us, and needless to say we were delighted.

"He is just the pleasantest, jolliest man to entertain you ever met, and he enjoyed every moment of his stay. Already he has shot on the plain in front of us seven lions, two giraffes, one rhino and a number of antelope.

"We went to a fruit farm and bought some apples so as to make him some real American apple pie, for we knew he might not get any at an English house. The moment it was set before him he turned to Sir Alfred and said: 'I want you to know this is good, old-fashioned, American apple pie.'

"Yesterday the party left for 'Ju Ju,' the farm of the McMillans, the American millionaire. At first Mr. Roosevelt said we were the first American ladies he had met—Miss Waechter and I—but later he remembered having met Mrs. McMillan.

"Next day in one sewing class it was amusing to hear the boys' remarks. One said that it must be nice to be the big man of the country, for all one would have to do would be to sleep. This, I think, would have amused our strenuous ex-president.

"They have all seen a picture of King Edward in his coronation robes, and I really believe they expected to see Roosevelt come up the path wearing a crown and red robe."

Mr. and Mrs. Johnston have lived at their present frontier post for something over a year.

CASH FOR CHARITY

Hearts Touched by Appeal to Help London's Poor Little Ones.

London, June 25.—Pearson's fresh air fund and the pathetic evidence in support of that admirable object to be seen every day in London streets have touched the hearts of American visitors in London, and when that has been said you can guess a lot what it means.

It means that the fund is being swelled to an extent unknown since the scheme was first conceived in the tender heart of Arthur Pearson, and this year thousands more poor children than usual will be taken for a holiday in the country they have never seen before and which to them is a dream of paradise.

It was Bert Levy, whose humorous caricatures are now one of the features of the programme of the Palace Theatre, who conceived the idea of adding tourist days to the fresh air fund, and he took on himself to organize a band of collectors to get from sympathizers a large sum of money for the purpose. To help the fund he painted a picture, "His Dream," which shows a little bootblack asleep in Trafalgar Square, listless and tired with the heat of the city, and he dreams just what every other London child dreams of, the green country and the grateful shade of the trees, the running music of the river, and of him and his playmates rollicking in the joys of the countryside.

The fresh air fund is reproducing Mr. Levy's picture in colors as a picture postcard, and these will be sold at 9d each, for 9d means one day's happiness to one child. The original of the picture is on view at Palace Theatre, and this it is proposed to sell by auction to the highest bidder, the proceeds to go to the tourists' days.

Mr. Levy's idea is to give the children of the London slums a real American day of joy and laughter.

"Every prominent American in London," he said, "is going to help me, and I shall have the aid of my stage colleagues, of whom there is also a colony in London."

"At present I need only to mention Walter C. Kelly, Rose Stahl and company and Clarice Vance among those who are eager to help. Some of us will accompany the children on their outing and entertain them with songs and recitations, and all of us are taking real heart interest in the project."

"There is no doubt about the American days going strong and that they will make a record in the history of the fresh air fund."

FAITH HEALER WINS

Court Says Jacob, Zouave, May Continue His "Cures."

Paris, June 25.—You have already been informed of the prosecution of Jacob the Zouave, by the faculty of medicine in Paris on a charge of illegally practicing medicine. By a recent decision of the courts this octogenarian may continue to exercise his alleged powers of faith healing as long as he lives.

Jacob the Zouave is 81 years old, and exercised faith healing long before the war of 1870. One of his boasts is that he once cured the prince imperial, and he has a long list of celebrated persons who profess to have been benefited by his treatment. Jacob is a veteran of the Crimean war and several subsequent campaigns, and besides faith healing is also distinguished as a trombone player. The long struggle between him and the faculty of medicine culminated in another complaint lodged against him recently by the Association of Physicians of the department of the Seine.

The court ruled in favor of Jacob. In its judgment, it says, that the fact of his wearing a long white gown, invoking some spirits or supernatural powers, with whom he claims to be in communication, and shaking hands with his patients, cannot be considered as the practice of medicine. The complaint of the physicians was, therefore, dismissed, and they are to pay the costs.

CRUEL TO CHILDREN
COUPLE PUNISHED

Adopted Little Ones Not Cared For, Poorly Fed and Beaten.

Paris, June 25.—Mr. and Mrs. J. Sargent were brought up before the police correctional court on a charge of having ill-treated certain children whom they had adopted. They were both found guilty and were sentenced, Mrs. Sargent to 13 months' imprisonment and \$20 fine and Mr. Sargent to two years' imprisonment and the same fine.

Evidence was brought that the children had often been ill-treated, being struck with a stick or a leather strap with unnecessary violence. According to one of the witnesses, a woman who had been a nurse in the house, Mr. Sargent one day threw a fork at one of the girls and transfixed her lip.

In the course of his examination Sargent admitted that he had occasionally struck the children, especially when he was under the influence of liquor, a condition in which, according to the evidence, he found himself frequently. A number of witnesses, nearly all of them former servants, declared that the children were badly fed.

One of the witnesses, Mme. Marchal, testified that she and her husband had allowed the Sargents five years ago to adopt one of her children, a little girl. Mme. Marchal gave her evidence without any sign of excitement, and when it was finished, turned round, flew at the prisoner, and tried to scratch her face.

Sargent came to his wife's assistance by picking up the walking stick of the interpreter employed in the case and striking her with it. The ushers and guards on duty finally put an end to the scene.
