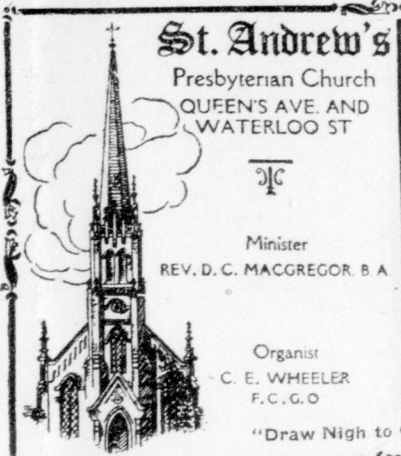

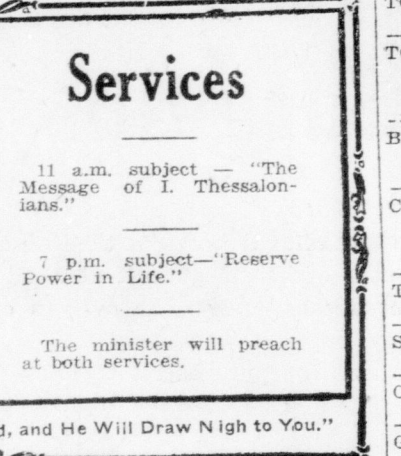

POULTRY FEATURES LOCAL MARKET AT STEADY PRICES

Potatoes Show Stronger With Probability of Rise in Near Future.

Poultry was the feature of the local market this morning. Prices were steady, although the supply was large. Chickens retailed for 50c to \$1.40 a pair, and ducks for 75c to \$1.40.

The vegetable supply was good, with the majority of prices firm. Few potatoes sold for less than \$2.25 a bag, and higher prices are looked for, as in many cases as high as \$2 a bag is being paid at shipping points. Cauliflowers were plentiful at 10c to 40c each. Dry onions were steady at \$2 to \$2.50 a bushel, and pumpkins sold for 5c to 15c each.

Apples had a brisk sale at 75c to \$1 a bushel. A few prices were offered at \$1 to \$1.25 a bushel, but they were small and not of the best quality.

Grain prices were firm at \$1.90 to \$2 a cwt. for old oats, and \$1.80 to \$2 a cwt. for new oats. Wheat brought \$1.60 a bushel for new, and \$1.50 a bushel for old. The price of hay was steady at \$12 to \$14 a ton. Straw was scarce at \$8.50 to \$9.25 a ton.

Live hogs sold for \$10.50 to \$10.50 a cwt., and fat sows for \$8. Small pigs had a slow market at \$1.50 to \$2 a pair. Dresser hogs brought \$15.50 a cwt.
