

## BOARD PRUNES PRICES OF CITY HOUSES AGAIN

Offers Remaining Pine Lawn  
Dwellings at \$3,100  
and \$3,300.

### HESSSEL URGES CAUTION

Questions Advisability of Re-  
bate to Purchasers at  
Original Values.

The housing commission on Thursday night undertook some further pruning on the cost of the Pine Lawn houses, reaching a decision to sell the remaining 19 or 20 houses at a flat rate of \$3,100 and \$3,300, for four and five roomed houses respectively. These prices include the commission, and will bring a net return to the commission of \$3,100 and \$3,300.

The amount added to the city's loss will be the extra-furnances where there are furnaces, fixtures, fencing, insurance, etc.

The matter of also granting a cut in the purchase price to buyers who have kept their payments up to date, may also be considered. Twenty-two or twenty-three houses have been sold and the commission's Clifford suggested that the next meeting of the commission should consider the matter of cutting these prices.

Chairman Hessel urged caution. He said that the finance committee had agreed to cut only on the unsold houses. It was suggested that if a cut was made, it would have to be done by crediting the purchasers with the amount of the cut, and allowing them to continue their payments as under the original price.

K. Miller, Cove road, appeared before the commission in regard to a Pine Lawn house purchased by his son-in-law, D. Bond. The latter came here from Windsor to get work. Miller aided him in purchasing the house, making the original \$200 payment. The son-in-law has returned to Windsor. Miller said that he had no claim on the commission, but he would like to make a deal whereby he could get his \$200 back or else carry on the payments of the house. As no payments have been made since August last, he said that he was aware that he had no legal claim.

**Impresses Commission.**  
Miller placed his position so fairly that he made an impression on the commission, and it was decided to let him carry on the purchase of the house at the cut price. He originally bought the house at \$4,075, and will now get it for \$3,300. He will have to pay up the arrears on the house, however, \$165, and will add \$5 monthly to his payments until this is repaid to the commission.

Mr. and Mrs. Link, who built a house under the private loan plan, and who have not yet started their payments, though they have been occupying their house for over a year, will be given 30 days to pay up their outstanding balance or proceedings will be taken to take the house over. They threaten to fight the commission.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Link had some hot things to say to the commission. "Who owes most, we or you? Answer this in a businesslike manner," was Mrs. Link's first remark. She alleged an 18-month breach of contract on the part of the commission because the house has not been completed.

Chairman Hessel asked Link if he intended to pay up and carry on the house.

**Could Not Get In.**  
Link's reply was that a year ago he was told the house would be fixed in a couple of weeks. Six months ago he was told the same thing.

Building Inspector Piper said that he had sent the contractor over to fix the house twice, and that he could not get in to do so.

Mr. and Mrs. Link departed, the husband saying that he would see a lawyer.

W. Chatterley said that his affairs were not in such shape that he will be able to start paying his usual payments plus \$10 a month extra until the arrears are wiped out. He is about a year in arrears.

Norman A. Lamb, 1888 Richmond street, wanted to know if he could get a loan. Mr. Baker said that as he interpreted the feeling of the finance committee, they wanted present matters cleaned up first.

E. B. Lavender presented a bill for fixtures installed. There have been numerous disputes over this work, the chairman remarking that there had been too much latitude allowed, too much taken for granted.

Mr. Piper will be asked to check up all fixture installations and accounts.

**Defects Alleged.**  
W. C. Fitzgerald wrote the commission that the D'Arcy house on Garfield avenue was faulty, outlining at length the defects. He was instructed to take action to set aside the agreement on the grounds of

## EGG IN AUSTRIA COSTS 180 KRONEN

Interesting facts concerning the depreciation of the Austrian kronen has come to light in a letter received by Mrs. E. E. Thomas, of 384 Central avenue, from her sister, Mrs. E. Teiger of Vienna, Austria.

The letter states one egg costs 180 kronen. In pre-war days the nominal value of a kronen was 27 cents in American money, but now the same kronen can be purchased for 60 cents a thousand.

One pair of boots sell at \$20,000 kronen, at the present rate that is \$20,000, prior to the war it was \$40.00. There is such a shortage of bread that the authorities are compelled to ration it at 316 kronen a loaf, and the citizens are only allowed to have one loaf a week.

Singing by Ted Bottams was particularly worthy of mention as well as comical songs rendered by V. Goggin and Bill Connors.

**Three Maidens Tried.**

The monologue touched on a great many popular topics with genuine wit. P. Madden exhibited some very clever soft shoe dancing. A voice, pure, even and indescribably melodious is the gift of Mrs. Counsell, enhanced by the most perfect control. Each number of her share of the program, given entirely in English, by the way, was a joy and a few gems because of the beauty of the singer's voice, the clearness of her enunciation, the warmth of feeling as well as intellectual grasp and artistic appreciation revealed.

**Singing Rarely Heard.**

Such singing of Handel is rarely heard as that which introduced Mrs. Counsell to her audience in "Where Now Art Thou, My Own Beloved One" (from Rodelinda). A recitative and aria, "Within What Gloomy Depths" (Saint Sulpice). Dvorak followed, given with gripping dramatic effect.

"A Spirit Flower" (Campbell Tip-top), "Hindu Stumble Song" (Harriet Ware, "My Ain Wee House" (Munro), "The Songster" (Charles E. Wheeler), and "The Bird of the Wilderness," each in turn proved so flawless as to seem new.

When a storm of applause greeted "The Songster," the gracious artist insisted that the composer, Mr. Wheeler, who was her sympathetic accompanist throughout the evening, should share with her the honors.

Good measure and running over, the music club provided on the occasion in presenting as well as Mrs. Counsell, Mr. Thomas Martin, pianist, whose appearance in recital in London is always a great occasion, and Miss Gurli C. Hausch, violinist, who though comparatively a newcomer here, has firmly established herself for her musicianship.
