

PRICE CHECK OF NORTH BAY BANDIT DEAL OR ALIVE

POLICE ORDERED
TO GET DESPERADO,
NO MATTER HOW

Leo Rogers, Murderer of Constable, Again Eludes Pursuers.

HEADS FOR THE EAST

Town of North Bay Offers \$500 Reward For the Capture.

Ottawa, May 18.—Leo Rogers, who murdered Constable Fred Lefebvre, and dangerously wounded Constable William McGovern and Constable Robb at North Bay, has escaped from pursuers and is headed for Ottawa, according to a wire received by Chief of Police A. M. Ross last night. The telegram was received from Constable G. P. Dunlevie, and was sent from Corbett, Ont.

Officers of both the city and provincial forces are watching every train from the west, both passenger and freight, for anyone answering the description of Leo Rogers. They are taking every precaution, and each man is armed and ready to carry out the order of "dead or alive," which has been sent throughout the country.

ELUDES PURSUERS.

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North Bay, May 18.—Leo Rogers, the young desperado who escaped from the courtroom here Wednesday, when about to be tried on a charge of carrying concealed weapons, tonight is reported to be near Corbett, having eluded posses of provincial police and townsmen who have been pursuing him through the area.

Tonight it was announced that the town of North Bay had offered a reward of \$500 for the capture of Rogers, dead or alive. The claim that Rogers, dead or alive, had been seen near Corbett by two of his pursuers, William Doyle and another man, who came upon him near a clump of trees, and fired twice. Both men fell flat on their faces and retreated about 100 yards, leaving Rogers to escape again. When last seen he was escaping through the woods.

AEROPLANES TO CARRY
VOTES FROM INDIANS

Government Arranging So the Reds of Far North May Exercise Franchise.

Toronto, May 18.—The Ontario government has made arrangements for the return of Indian voters to vote at Moose Factory and Port Albany to vote in the elections next June. It is not true that aeroplanes will bring voters from Moose Factory and Port Albany to vote at Cochrane, but it is true that aeroplanes will take officials to Moose Factory and Port Albany to prepare the voters' lists and also take deputy returning officers to these places to conduct the elections. The aeroplanes and returning officers will be brought back to Cochrane by aeroplane. There is an aeroplane at Rainy Lake, 40 miles from Cochrane, and the government has made arrangements to take aeroplanes from this camp. Port Albany is 200 miles along the shore of James Bay from Moose Factory, and in the direction of Port Nelson. Many of the Indian settlers at these places fought with the Canadian forces in France.

BOY, STEALING RIDE,
SUFFERS BROKEN ARM

Indian Lad Injured by C.N.R. Express at Egerton Street Yesterday.

Albert Lorne, an Indian boy in his teens, who was trying to steal a ride on the Canadian National Railway at Niagara Falls, was knocked off a train at Egerton street at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Dr. F. R. Clegg, who first attended the boy, found that his left arm was broken and that the left side had been injured. The boy was removed to Victoria Hospital, where he was under an anaesthetic and examined by the X-ray. At 4:45 he was still being examined and the full nature of his injuries was not known.
