

Everything the Farmer Trades In

TRADE REMAINS DULL ON CATTLE MARKET

Five or Six Hundred Animals
Were Held Over,
Unsold.

Toronto, April 26.—Market closed dull, with 500 or 600 cattle holding over unsold. With the exception of a few light, choice butchers, there was little or no real demand for anything else. A lot of rough cattle constitute the bulk of the holdover, with a few fair quality, weaghty steers. There was no export trade in cattle, and but few light steers on store cattle. Prices were little changed from yesterday, the decline holding steady at about 25c off the choicest butchers and 30c to 50c off common, rough, unfinished cattle.

Cattle unchanged, but market weak. No fresh sheep or lambs offering.

Montreal April 26.—With only 72

Cattle, 55 sheep and lambs, 112 hogs and 720 calves for sale on the two markets on Wednesday. Trading was steady and prices generally on a level with earlier in the week. A large number of the cattle offered were common and medium quality and these were the main buyers. Common cows brought from \$3 to \$3.75, one lot of fairly good veal calves brought \$8; medium ones sold for \$9 to \$10.75, and some of the best for \$12. Trading was only moderately active.

Spring lambs were most plentiful and prices were steady to a touch down on weight and fleecing.

Hogs were steady at \$12 for good lots; mixed lots, including a few hawks, brought \$11.50 to \$11.75; sows, \$3.50 to \$4.

Spring lambs were more plentiful and sold from \$5 to \$10 each, depending on weight and fleshing.
