Canadian Press Despatch Montreal, July 14.-Reports that Grand Duchess Anastasie, daughter of the murdered ex-czar of Russia, is still alive are "all nonsense," it was asserted here today by Princess Zizianoff, widow of a Russian general who was related to the Romanoffs and foundress of a Russian refugee institution in New York.

Princess Zizianoff, in a graphic declaration of the murder of the Russian royal family at Ekaterinburg in 1917, of the circumstances of which she claimed positive knowledge. was due primarily to an error on the part of the czar's Bolshevik guards. The latter had received an order to "put the family away in case of danger from the Czecho-Slovakia army." And they interpreted it to mean that the Romanoffs were to be killed, the princess said.
