The interrogators had in mind yestered. terday's opening session of parlia-ment, when the premier was given a vote of confidence on his recon-structed cabinet's program, but only with the aid of former political ene-mies and with 121 deputies refrain-ing from voting ing from voting.

The ballot showed 221 to 169 in favor of the premier's plans. The vote of confidence gives the government a lease of life over the opposition of the Socialists, but in political circles the opinion prevails that it will not extend over any great length of time. It is considered in these circles that an administration which can count on only 220 out of the 580 votes in the chamber hardly has suf-ficient strength behind it to undertake imperative legislation.

One things appears to be as certain as anything can be certain in French politics: that the famous coalition of the Left parties which won the elections in 1924 is broken by the defection of the Socialist half and that a majority for the government has not yet emerged. That majority was expected to come from the central benches and to form around Foreign Minister Briand, who, with his Lo-Minister Briand, who, with his Locarno laurels still fresh on his brow, at present enjoys more prestige than

at present enjoys more prestige than any French statesman has enjoyed for some time past.
