THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE. Mr. Ross' Bill re Fees of Public Officers Forced Through.

Toronto, April 30.—[Special.]—Notwithstanding assertions to the contrary, which have been made by Liberal partisans, the Opposition leader's energy has not waned with the closing hours of the present Parliament. His own enthusiasm, too, he seems to have imparted to his following. Those facts were evidenced to-day, when a vigorous assault was made upon the untenable stand taken by the Government in regard to the fee system. Mr. Ross' Bill to amend the act respecting the fees of certain public officers was up for its third reading. At this stage three admirable propositions were made by the Opposition. Of course the adamant Tories to the right of the Speaker would not listen to the most rational expostulations. Mr. Wood first moved in amendment that all the surplus revenue of the offices affected by the bill, should go to the municipality instead of as at present to the Government. Mr. Whitney suggested that the bill state the maximum salary to be paid, and that all the residue revenue of the offices be applied to public uses. Mr. Meredith made the last attempt to improve a lamentably faulty measure. He moved for the addition of a clause to secure the proper auditing of the accounts of fee-paid officials, so that, in a recent instance, no juggling of the figures might take place. Such an addition, he thought, was necessary and proper, useful and desirable. All three amendments were voted down.

A PIER GIVES WAY. 120 Persons on it When it Collapsed—Many Drowned.

Brailov, Roumania, April 30.—By the giving way of a pier, extending from shore to the channel of the Danube, this morning a number of persons were drowned and several badly hurt. The pier was crowded with people awaiting the steamer for Galatz, where they intended to celebrate the Greek Easter, when suddenly the pier sank with a crash, and about 130 persons were thrown into the river. Not more than two-thirds of that number have been accounted for, and it is believed most of the missing ones have been drowned, as a few are known to have been saved. Several of the rescued ones were severely hurt by falling timbers.

A FATAL LANDSLIDE. Ten Persons Lose Their Lives by It in the Province of Quebec.

Quebec, Q., April 30.—News has reached here from St. Alban, situated some forty miles west of here, that on Friday's tremendous landslide occurred at a water-level one hundred feet above the level of the River St. Anne. A mile long of land, with farm houses and their contents, were thrown into the river bed. Some ten persons lost their lives.

HE KILLED HIS FATHER. Tragedy in Burr Oak, Mich.—Jay Seymour shot Dead by His Son.

Sturgis, Mich., April 29.—Jay Seymour was shot and instantly killed by his son at his home in Burr Oak at 11 o'clock last night. The boy had been drinking and returned home and began breaking the furniture, kicking out the windows and otherwise destroying things. His 16-year-old son, who was alone with him in the house, tried to pacify him, when he knocked his son down and began to pound him. The boy drew his revolver and fired one ball striking him in the mouth and in the right breast, which produced instant death. Mr. Seymour was about 48 years of age and leaves a widow and several children. He had taken the Keely cure, but had returned to drinking again.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS. Serious Trouble Expected at the May Day Meetings.

400 Killed and 20,000 Destitute in Greece—The Grand Trunk Shareholders' Meeting—British Grain Trade—Attempt—Assassinate Archduke Joseph—The American Award Reduced—A Coming Royal Marriage—The Colnago of Rupees by the India Mint Forbidden.

London, April 30, midnight. Pelotas captures Paranaguá. A cable from Montevideo says President Peixoto's fleet has captured Paranaguá, Brazil, the last of the rebel forts. No resistance was made.

Medals from a French Cannon. Emperor William proposes to observe the 25th anniversary of Sedan by decorating the survivors with medals which will be struck from cannon taken from the French. The proposal has excited much comment and not a little disapproval in military circles.

The Mufti Hanged. The Mufti of Yuzgat was found hanged recently. Pinned to his sleeve was a note saying that this was the first instalment of Armenian debt to Turkish officials. Yuzgat has been one of the centres of persecution practised by the Mohammedans upon the Armenians.

A Notable Reduction in Amount. A despatch to the London Standard from Bern says:—Switzerland has represented to Dr. Caspari, the Swiss Minister at Washington, that it has decided in regard to the arbitration between Chili and America, to award \$240,000, instead of the \$9,000,000 demanded.

Royal Marriage. Prince Charles of Bourbon, Duke of Madrid, the Bourbon pretender to the Spanish throne, was married at Prague yesterday morning to Princess Marie Berthe de Rohan. The ceremony was performed in the cathedral by Cardinal Von Schonborn, Archbishop of Prague. A large number of guests were present.

May Day in Rome. The prompt and decisive action of the Italian Government to repress all disorders on May Day has quelled most of agitation in favor of lawless demonstrations. The prospect is that no determined effort will be made to hold open air meetings or parades in the larger cities.

G. S. Thieves in London. The effects of Adolph and Montagu Bernhard, who were arrested in Fishbury yesterday by Detective Forest and Harrigan, have been searched, with the result of finding a large amount of property, presumably stolen. The Bernhards are wanted in the United States for larceny and embezzlement.

Austrian Bricklayers on Strike. Thirty thousand masons and bricklayers are on strike in Vienna and vicinity, and they have been joined by the carpenters. The police have thus far succeeded in preventing disorder. A large number of Socialists who were connected with the riots at Holdmeze, Vasarhely, have been arrested, and will be prosecuted.

No Disorder Feared at Paris. The Paris police authorities express belief that there will be no disorder in the city on the occasion of the May Day observances to-morrow, and the great of U. S. Minister Hendrick there. He leaves on Tuesday for Vienna, and then will go for a tour to one of the German springs. Mr. Chantler says his expedition was fairly successful, though he was beset by many mishaps. He will make a report of his explorations to the New York Geographical Society.

The Pope Vexed at Spanish Jesuits. The Pope is much annoyed by the fanatical intolerance of the Spanish Jesuits at Piazansa, where they wish to burn some books they considered wicked. Among them were certain of Zola's writings. He is vexed at the affront to the author of "Lords of the Dawn" by the beginning the publication of his famous trilogy, in which the place of honor will be for mystic Rome. He plainly said:—Instead of burning books they think wicked it would be better if they would try to write good books themselves.

May Day in Berlin. May Day will be celebrated in Berlin with 30 workmen's and Socialist meetings. Twenty of the meetings will be held as trade assemblies, and the rest as political demonstrations. The published programme for May Day shows how thoroughly the workmen of the capital have been organized by the Social-Democrats. The management of this organization rests with the Central Social Democratic Committee, which has patterned its system after the military model, so that its forces can be mobilized quickly and easily when the time comes for an impressive demonstration. So far there has been nothing to indicate that the peace will be disturbed.

May Day in Austria. May Day is expected to be peaceful in Vienna, unless the strikers from the builders' trades raise a disturbance. It feared in the provinces, especially in Moravia and Bohemia, there will be riot

and bloodshed. Troops have been sent to several large towns, and outdoor parades have been forbidden both in Austria and Hungary.

Meeting of Grand Trunk Shareholders. The meeting of the Grand Trunk share-holders held to-day was presided over by Sir Henry Tyler. The president referred to the decreasing business, which was in part met by a decrease in operating expenses. The current half-yearly interest on debenture bonds would be fully earned. Sir Henry's report stated that the American railroads were of the opinion that the Inter-state Commerce Law would have to be modified. He hoped that Canada would shortly abolish or modify the coal duties. The amount which the Grand Trunk paid annually as a duty on coal was nearly £74,000. A small dividend upon the guaranteed stock had been provided for and the president promised that exceptional measures would be taken for a reduction of expense. There was an animated discussion, and Mr. Household moved for a commission of investigation, supporting his motion by attacking the directors, but the report was adopted by a large majority and Household's motion defeated.

Not Open to Free Colnago. In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Foster, Secretary for India, said there was no foundation for the report that it was proposed to reopen India mints to free colnago of rupees. Sir Thos. Esmond and James F. Hogan questioned the Government concerning the proposed annexation of Samow to New Zealand. Sir Edward Grey, Under Foreign Secretary, said it would be impossible to adopt the proposal of New Zealand without the consent of Germany and the United States, which there was no reason to expect. The Government, however, were pursuing the matter. Home Secretary Asquith introduced a bill amending the factory law with a view to ensuring a greater degree of safety and a higher standard of health in workshops.

May Day Meetings in Germany. An identical resolution will be passed at all the May Day meetings held throughout Germany to-morrow, demanding full equality before the law, unfettered liberty to combine in trades unions or other organizations, the abolition of child labor, protection to female labor, and that such labor shall not be exploited, and the thorough organization of workmen. The Berlin Anarchists will hold a separate meeting in the morning. At Hamburg the Socialists have issued 3,000 leaflets announcing that they will hold meetings at indicated places, but that the idea of a procession has been abandoned.

Rioting in Vienna. A quarrel arose this afternoon between workmen and strikers in Ottakring, a suburb of the city. A policeman in trying to stop the quarrel fired his revolver, wounding two of the strikers. A general riot followed. Reinforcement of foot and mounted police were summoned to the scene. These were savagely attacked by the mob, but they succeeded in dispersing the rioters after three hours of hard fighting. Several arrests were made.

Lawlessness in Ireland. Two farm houses in Condralaw, County Clare, from which the tenants had been evicted, were fired into by unknown persons Friday night. The houses were in possession of caretakers. On the same night the wife of a caretaker named Quirk, living on a farm near Killynure, was fired at but not wounded.

Four Hundred Persons Killed. The Foreign Minister at Athens has informed the Greek Charge d'Affaires here that 400 persons were killed by recent earthquakes in Greece, and 20,000 rendered homeless and destitute. The Greek colony in London are subscribing to the relief of the sufferers.

Tried to Kill the Archduke. Somebody fired a shot yesterday at a train carrying the Archduke Joseph from Budapest. The bullet entered the compartment next to the one occupied by the Archduke, and lodged in the woodwork without having injured anybody.

Severe Sentences. At Barcelona the prisoners concerned in the Anarchist outrage were sentenced to-day. Czerezulza, Bernat, Sojas and Conina are to be garroted, and Mir, Villarubia, Morells and Carbonell are to be imprisoned for life at hard labor.

Relief for the Sufferers. The Lord Mayor has opened at the Mission House a fund for the relief of the sufferers from the earthquakes in Greece. King George, with three of his sons, will leave Athens for Thebes to-morrow. The Queen will go to Thebes later.

Cholera. At Lisbon forty-five fresh cases of cholera were reported to the health authorities yesterday. There were reported also 64 recoveries from the disease and 284 patients under treatment. Twenty-six fresh cases of cholera were reported to-day.

Bombs Exploded. Bombs were exploded in the police offices in Ancona and Leghorn, Italy, to-day. In each case much damage was done, but nobody was hurt. Many persons suspected of being connected with the explosions have been arrested.

Five Killed in a Collision. A freight train and a passenger train on the Koslow & Voronezh Railway came into collision near Marzhanik, Russia, to-day. Both engines and fourteen carriages were wrecked and five persons were killed.
