DEALING IN MILLIONS. Detroit United Stockholders Under Reorganization-Will Make a Nice

Thing Out of it.

Detroit, Aug. 31.-Details of the reorganization of the electric lines recently acquired by the Everett-Moore syndicate have been learned through a circular issued at headquarters. The stock of the Detroit United, amounting to \$12,500,000, and the outstanding bonds amounting to \$13,267,000, are to be deposited with the Guaranty Trust Co., of New York, with the assent of the holders. The railway company is to be organized as a Michigan concern, with a capital of \$21,500,000, and \$50,-000,000 of gold-bearing 4 per cent. bonds, of which \$15,767,000 is to be retained as treasury security to pay outstanding bonds. Besides this \$17,000,000 is to be retained to pay for extensions and \$2,983,000 for present obligations of the Detroit United. The remaining \$13,750,000 is to be used in acquiring the present stock of the Detroit United. Under this plan present stockholders will be offered \$105 of bonds for \$100 of stock.
