### SCIENCE SCHOOLS FOR TEACHERS

Under the Departments of Agriculture and Education two Rural Science Schools for teachers will be held in New Brunswick during the coming summer; one at Woodstock and one at Sussex.

The purpose of these schools is to give practical instruction to teachers in Nature Study and Agriculture under the divisions—Plant Life, Animal Life, School Gardening and Home Plots, Farm Mechanics and Rural Domestic Science.

These subjects supply to the teacher an opportunity to vitalize rural education, to bring the schools into closer relation with the life of country communities while at the same time they afford a means for making that education broad and cultural.

"The principle of learning by doing" will be strongly emphasized at these Summer Schools. The length of session will be four weeks. They begin on July 14th.





### MEETING OF THE LIVE STOCK ASSOC.

At Eel River Well Attended—Important Questions Discussed—More Members Enrolled

A very successful and exceptionally well attended meeting of this Association was held at Eel River Crossing on Thursday afternoon, Jan. 28th. Farmers and others interested came, in some instances, from several miles distant to hear matters of particular interest discussed along the line of importing thoroughbred stock. Mr. D. G. Stewart was elected Chairman of the meeting and in the absence of Mr. Murray Gerrard, the Secretary of the Association, Mr. Thos. J. McDevitt acted in this capacity.

Mr. W. D. Duncan, the President, gave an outline of the working of the Association throughout the County, also of the agreement with the Federal Government for securing live stock of standard breed, and explained very clearly the difference between the Association and the Agricultural Society, and the great privilege the farmers of this county enjoyed in being able to purchase stock of registered pedigree through the Federal Government.

Mr. D. A. Stewart, M. L. A., briefly outlined the proper procedure to secure the stock from the Live Stock Commissioner at Ottawa. Mr. John Bright, with whom he had had considerable correspondence of a very satisfactory nature.

Mr. W. S. Montgomery of Dalhousie who was present at the meeting, strongly advocated the advisability of purchasing a horse of a class that would be of good service to the farmer and which at any time would command a ready sale. This suggestion was heartily endorsed by those present.

Several resolutions were then put before the meeting:—  
Moved by John McKinnon, seconded by N. W. Perrott, that the Association approve of a horse weighing not less than 1600 lbs., Percheron preferred, a second choice Suffolk Punch. Carried.

Moved by Hugh Archibald, seconded by James Wright, that the Hackney now the property of the Association be changed for a French Canadian horse, provided the Committee could make the necessary arrangements. Carried.

It was agreed that Mr. D. G. Stewart be act as delegate to outside meetings connected with the Association. The meeting was then adjourned.

Since the above meeting was held, Mr. D. A. Stewart has received confirmation from Mr. John Bright, the Commissioner at Ottawa, that the Association is at liberty to secure a Percheron Stallion suitable for the requirements of this district. The Government will purchase the animal provided he is properly registered and meets the requirements of the Department.

### SALMON BEACH


