Melbourne, Victoria, March 8.—Stoddard's cricketers to-day finished the final game of a most sensational cricket tour. In fach, it is said to have been the most sensational tour ever undertaken. They played five games, two at Sydney, two here and one at Adelaide. The visitors won the first two games and lost the third and fourth. The All-Australian eleven to-day soored 414 runs in the first inning abl 267 in the second inning, a total of 62. Stoddard's English team scored 385 runs in the first inning and 298 in the second for four wickets, a total of 683, thus winning the match with six wickets to spare. The gate money amounted to \$20,000. The highest score in any innings, 586, was made by Australia. 
