EASTER DAY AND ITS SIGNIFICANCE

Since civilization began, Easter Day has been one of the most significant anniversaries of the year. From days of remote antiquity Easter has been observed with rejoicing and thankfulness because it marked the opening of the vernal season, the end of winter, the return of green life, fellows of grass and flowers and leafage. To dwellers in northern climates it was a festival full of deep meaning and was the occasion of profound grati-tude as the advent of the vivifying influence of spring. At the present time people do not live so close to nature; and do not appreciate as strongly the true significance of Easter Day.

In ancient temples sacred fires were kindled afresh and worshippers gave thanks to the old divinities for the return of light, heat and growth. Still in many parts of Europe, there is a survival of these rites, in form of bonfires lighted upon the same hill each year, which is known as Easter hill. The people believe that as far as the light from these fires reaches, the fields will be fruitful, and that the dwellings on which their light shines will be free from sickness or trouble during the year.

From the earliest periods of civilization Easter has been characterized by dancing, games and sports among the country people of Europe, and special Easter cakes were baked. The custom survives to the present day-in the form of "Hot Cross Buns." Brightly painted eggs were presented and the ancient custom still persists in some European countries. Many old people will remember that years ago decorated eggs appeared on every breakfast table on Easter morning, and the children were allowed to eat as many eggs as they could. Candy eggs and other confections, toy rabbits and other trifles now brighten Easter Day for children.

The religious significance of Easter is that it commerates the resurrection and is also the memorial of the Christian passover-of the atonement wrought by the death of Christ on the cross.

The name "Easter" is derived from the Teutonic divinity Ostara, patroness of light and spring. In the early days of Christianity, the ancient pagfestival became the Christian paschal feast. The year A.D. 68, has been named as the time of the formal institution of the Christian anniversary. Let us all join this Easter in the privileges accorded us of attending church and thanking and praising God for His inestimable love son, Jesus Christ.
