Mei-Mei—Your Forgotten Sister—An appeal to the women of Christian lands to remember their sisters dying in darkness and sadness in China; the Master's words, "Inasmuch as ye did it not" pleading for workers, to "gather in the sheaves." This little sketch contrasts the life of Mei Mei, born in a Chinese home where nobody welcomes her, with that of little Mary in a Christian land, who, listening on her teuth birthday to the story of Mei-Mei's unhappy and lonely lot, decides to carry the good news to her little heathen sister," but as years pass on other "things of this life" engross her time, these resolutions are forgotten, and Mei Mei dies, with "no ray of light," sad and alone.
