

## Hemostatic Serum Hemorrhage

WHEN the physician administers Hemostatic Serum to a bleeding patient, he knows that he is employing effective means to promote bloodcoagulation.

The patient may be suffering from a lack of active prothrombin; or from a faulty conversion of prothrombin into thrombin through the absence of the substance essential to this conversion, thrombokinase. Again, the presence of too much antithrombin may be the factor retarding or preventing the process of blood-coagulation.
