By referring to former statements, it will be seen that the amount raised has increased year by year; mor will it at present be deemed inconsiderable by those who remember that the effort to direct attention to this subject is comparatively recent, and that the claims of spiritual destitution in our very midst are neither few nor of slender importance. It is a fallacy, to suppose that contributions made for missions to the heathen are a deduction by so much from the fund that would be appropriated to the relief of the settlers scattered up and down throughout the land in which we live. On the contrary, these latter would seem to be gainers by what is done for the heathen—since, the wider the sphere of benevolence embraced by the Christian, the more healthful and abounding is the exercise of his sympathy. Whatever tends to impress deeply upon the mind the conviction that no man liveth to mimself, tends to enlarge the disposition to do good; and, the disposition enlarged, a corresponding ability

will not seldem be discovered.

Nothing tends more to render this truth interestong and instructive to the minds of youth than a grequent representation of the state of the heathen world; and nothing is more likely to deepen the ampression made upon them than their own self-denying exertions on behalf of the heathen:—hence nothing is better fitted, under the blessing of God, to train them to general habits of active benevolence than the work in which the collectors in aid

of missionary efforts are engaged.
The Rev. C. L. F. Haensel, at the close of the

Meeting, while requesting to be informed, in a direct manner or through the Superintendents of Sunday Schools, of the names of those who wished to be supplied again with missionary boxes, stated the necessity that the parents should give their consent to the youthful collectors' undertaking this service. There may be a suspicion in some persons lest, through juvenile associations, children assume a position invading the sacredness of the commandment with promise; the wish, therefore, is the more ardently entertained that parental consent and encouragement may be given to the exertions of the young, which we must hope and pray will return a blessing into families where, but for the invitation addressed to them by this Association, the duty of a concern for the spiritual wants of the heathen would probably be little remembered and less carried into practice.

ENGLAND'S NATIONAL DEFENCES .- The Duke of Wellington has addressed a letter to Major General Sir John J. Burgoyne, in which he describes the present state of the southern English coast as very defenceless against a French invasion, bearing in mind the facilities afforded to a hostile power by the creation of a steam-navy; he says that in vain he has endeavoured to awaken the attention of different administrations to this state of things. The measure recommended by His Grace is "to raise, embody, organise, and discipline the militia of the same numbers for each of the three kingdoms united as during the late war. This would give a mass of organ-ized force amounting to about 150,000 men, which might immediately set to work to discipline. This alone would enable us to establish the strength of our army. This, with an augmentation of the force of the regular army, which would not cost £400,000, would put the country on its legs in respect to personal force, and I would engage for its defence old

PRECAUTIONS AGAINST CHOLERA.—A meeting has been held in the Vestry-room, St. Stephen's Walbrook, London, for the purpose of carrying out the suggestion contained in the Bishop of London's letter on the subject of sanatory preparations for the cholera. Dr. Croly, the Rector, presided. He said that the object of the meeting was to establish a local committee, to ensure to the poorer classes greater facilities for cleanliness, and a better supply of fresh air. Mr. Beggs, Secretary to the Health of Towns Association, stated that he was authorised to offer all the assistance in the power of the Association in furtherance of these objects. He impressed on the meeting the importance of making their arrangements permanent; for, although the cholera was a formidable foe, yet it had never destroyed so many persons in England as typhus fever; typhus annually destroys 16,000 persons.

MEXICO. A report had reached the American FATT, jr., of a daughter. forces on the Rio Grande, that a force of 10,000 Mexicans, under General Bustamente, was marching from San Luis to Saltillo.-A conspiracy for attacking the quarters of all the principal officers of the American army at Mexico had been discovered and was prevented from breaking out by the preparations made for defeating it. The deserted streets, on the night proposed for the attempt, seemed to show that the population in the capital generally were informed of the design, and kept within doors to leave the field open to the conspirators.

A man named Goodwin, residing on the Ottawa river, had turned his wife out of doors, and kept her in a pig-per through the height of winter, covered by a blanket and scantily fed by her children through the grates His excuse for this inhuman treatment was an alle gation of disreputable character against her, and that she was not in her right mind. The Rev. Fred. S. Neve, of our Church, applied his humane offices, though the parties belonged to the Church of Rome, by remonstrating with the husband, by applying for authoritative interposition, and by offer ing pecuniary assistance, but in vain. The woman died, and the husband has been convicted of manslaughter. It must be hoped that in the Peniten tiary he will reflect upon the revolting crime of which he has been guilty, and that he will repent and seek pardon where alone it may be found.
