THE REPUBLIC OF GOD. By Uloha Mulford, D.D., author of "The Nation's Creed." The Week.

HOME NEWS.

Oct. 16th being Hospital Sunday in Halifax, collections were made in all the Churches for the Dispensary.

A Canadian Merchant sent in one week in September 378,000 eggs from one village of Ontario to New York.

Canso, N. S., Oct. 13.—The light house, fog horn, and every building in Cranberry Island, were destroyed by fire last night.

Mr. F. B. Coleman, of Fredericton, has been awarded a contract for building one hundred miles of the Canada Pacific west of Winnipeg.

The Windsor Mail understands that Mr. Archibald will remove his knitting factory from Wolfville to Halifax, owing to a difficulty in getting female operators.

The Nova Scotia Sugar Refinery Company, during the past month, shipped seven thousand eight hundred and eighty barrels of refined sugar, and seventy barrels of refined syrup.

The steel works will soon be in active operation at Smeck Brook, near New Glasgow. The glass works are doing an excellent business, and it is said they have more orders than they can fill.

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—All the stock of the new Canadian Mutual Telegraph Company has been taken up, and the promoters are making every effort to get their line up this year between Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Hamilton, and Buffalo.

Four schools for practical military instruction of officers of infantry are authorized to be opened, viz. one in Toronto, one at Montreal, and one in St. John, on Wednesday, 4th January next, and one at Ottawa on Wednesday, the 8th of February.

The gold yield of the Nova Scotia mines from 1862 to 1880 inclusive, was by the official reports, 310,666 ozs., 5dwts., 5grs., valued at \$20 per ounce, \$6,212,125; the labor was 3,930,883 days at \$1.25, equal to \$3,778,664; the royalty 2 per cent on the oz. at \$18 was less than \$124,242.

As a substitute for the proposed Bay Verte Canal Mr. Ketchum, C. E. of New Brunswick, proposes a ship railway. His letters in favor of such a work, including one addressed to Sir Charles Tupper in May last, have now been collected and published in pamphlet form, with a plan of the proposed railway.

A Surprised Physician.

A LIVING PATIENT RECOVERS THROUGH THE INTERPOSITION OF A HEMBLE GLEMAN.—Some weeks ago Dr. G—, a very reputable and widely-known physician, living on C— street, was called to attend a very complicated case of rheumatism. Bradford, Pa., Oct. 14.—A magazine containing 300 pounds of nitro glycerine exploded near here last night. Two men are supposed to have been killed.

Vienna, Oct. 14.—At the funeral of Baron Von Haymerle, on Thursday, the Emperor, the whole diplomatic body, Austrian and Hungarian ministers, Papal Nuncio and many members of the Reichsrath were present.
