

Christian, named Iva Miketich, at Toula, and when his fellow-Christians complained to the Kaimakan, who was perfectly acquainted with the assassins, he gave an evasive answer, knowing perfectly well that we should not name them, or we should ourselves be murdered. Another complaint made after the murder of a Christian named Boza-Trinetich, killed by a Turk, produced a similar result. A Turk of the name of a Christian in the village of Macotchetob, because he saw a gold coin in his possession; and two Turks murdered a young female at Palanka, after having ill-used her. Two pandours took a child and used it as a target to shoot at. This revolting conduct is sure to produce reprisals on the part of the Christians. You see, that notwithstanding the humane disposition of the Sultan, notwithstanding all the homages, taximats, and battisments, the position of the Christians is not improved. On the contrary, the yoke is becoming more oppressive and intolerable. Several Bays and Agas plunder them as they did at the most despotical period of Mahomedanism. The Turks themselves ridicule all the proclamations published by the Sultan with respect to the Christians—they call them papers steeped in honey. We constantly ask ourselves how Christian Europe, how civilized Powers can suffer such abominable scandal. Two Austrian merchants were ill-treated in the town of Toula by the soldiers. The Austrian Consul demanded satisfaction, and not being able to obtain any, he has struck his flag. It is thus that the Turks conduct themselves even towards Austria, who, though sick herself, has used every effort to defend her neighbor who is falling into decay. In a word, we are now suffering more iniquity than ever we did; nevertheless we have a firm hope of being efficaciously assisted by a great Power which never refused us its protection, and we trust that we have seen nearly the last of our persecutions—we shall experience the joy of seeing Islamism trampled under foot, and the cross of our Saviour triumphant.
