Also,—Return to an Order of the House of June 25, 1952, for a Return showing:—1. What was the total amount of coal produced in the Maritime Provinces bought by the Canadian National Railway in the year 1951, from (a) Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation; (b) other coal operators?

2. What was the total amount of subventions paid to the Canadian National Railways for carrying Maritime coal to various subvention areas for the year 1951?

Also,—Return to an Order of the House of July 2, 1952, for a Return showing:—1. How many requests for the use of the privilege of using the word "Royal" has the Government considered within the past two years?

2. How many such requests have been approved and to whom were they granted?

3. How many such requests have been refused?

4. How many are still pending?

5. Has the Government of Canada or the Government of the United Kingdom refused to recommend to the Sovereign any such petitions?

6. Are there any conditions on the use of the word "Royal", and if so, what are they?

And also,—Return to an Order of the House of July 2, 1952, for a Return showing:—1. How many temporary track men are employed by the Canadian National Railway, at the present time, in extra track gangs working on each of the Western, Central and Atlantic regions?

2. What wages are paid to these men in each of the above regions?

3. Does the Canadian National Railway collect any amount for board from these men? If so, how much in each of these regions?
