OIL SPILL IN THOUSAND ISLANDS AREA OF ST. LAWRENCE RIVER—INVOLVEMENT OF CANADIAN GOVERNMENT IN CLEAN-UP

Mr. Jack Murta (Lisgar): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of the Environment and it has to do with the recent oil spill in the Thousand Islands area of the St. Lawrence River system. Is the federal government involved in any way in the clean-up operations and, if so, to what extent? Further, is there any danger to the Canadian side of the river?

[Translation]

Hon. Jean Marchand (Minister of the Environment): Yes, Mr. Speaker, some 4,000 barrels of crude oil were spilled in the area of the Thousand Islands, on the American side. There is a real danger that the crude could reach Canadian shores between Brockville and Kingston. Naturally, that will depend on both currents and winds. I know that at the present time violent winds are blowing. The United States have recognized that the spill is their responsibility, they are taking steps to prevent the crude from reaching the Canadian side. But we have no assurance that it will not, and we are working with them to reduce damages to a minimum.

Mr. Murta: My supplementary is, really, the first part of my question. If that is the case, could the minister bring us up to date as to exactly what the federal government is doing to ensure that in the event the oil does move into the Kingston area the authorities will be prepared to deal with it?

Mr. Marchand (Langelier): Yes, Mr. Speaker, we are working in co-operation with the American authorities. If at some point the Americans cannot contain the spill alone, there is no doubt that the Department of Transport and the Department of the Environment will help them directly.
