the many abominable and delusive falschoods contained in his pamphlet? I have great pleasure in stating, that after a long debate with him, in the presence of several gentlemen-amongst whom were two friends of mine who as well as myself were emigrants-I completely succeeded in manifesting and proving to this veracious Mr. Cuttermole, that he had propagated the most barefaced and unwarrantable statements; one of which I mentioned respecting Betts, (vide p. 18,) and on my naming this to him he said, "that what he had stated was correct, for he never published or asserted any thing but from his own personal observation, and that he would not even take his brother's word for any thing in the way of information, as he made it an invariable rule to Le an eye witness of every case before committing it to paper." However, on appealing to my two friends for the accuracy of my assertion respecting Betts, they fully substantiated my charge. Cattermole, on being thus refuted apologized by saying, that in this case he had been only informed of the circumstance !

This Mr. Cattermole, in his pamphlet, further assures his readers, that from his hnowledge of Canada he is caabled to state, accurately, the description of percens best adapted for the country,

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
