

JUDGMENT TO BE DELIVERED LATER

McConkey's Appeal Against Suspension of License Heard by Judge Denton.

MAGISTRATE ATTACKED

Counsel Says Col. Denison Almost Put Words in Mouths of Witnesses.

The appeal of E. G. McConkey against the suspension of his liquor license was heard before Judge Denton yesterday and judgment was reserved. The license was suspended on Feb. 28 when Ernest G. McConkey was convicted of keeping a disorderly house on New Year's Eve by Police Magistrate Denison.

Before the case was opened Crown Attorney Greer presented the charge that the appeal could not be heard because under the statute appeal was allowable only when imprisonment or a money fine was imposed. Suspension of license was neither of these. The judge said he would hear the case subject to this objection.

Then M. H. Ludwig, K.C., appearing for the appellant, drew attention to a recent precedent where in the case of the King v. Farrow the judge had maintained that findings made in the police court were wholly irrelevant, and that the case was not an appeal but a retrial. He held that by the judgment of the case he cited, it was necessary for the crown again to take all the evidence of the witnesses who were heard in police court. In this he was sustained by the court.

A House Without Order. "I have read the evidence and I must again do so, therefore it is not essential that you read all the police court evidence," said Judge Denton to Mr. Greer. The latter then gave his reasons for maintaining that on New Year's Eve after 11 o'clock McConkey's house would be properly termed a disorderly house. He did not mean to imply it was a house of ill-repute, but it was a house without order—a disorderly house. He quoted authorities, including the standard dictionary, to prove his ideas of the terms "disorderly house" and "riotous" were the right ones. Then he traced briefly the evidence given, how the policeman on duty had seen women carried out drunk, what waiters had seen, and how Mr. McConkey was the centre of the plan for the evening's entertainment.

Mr. Ludwig's Defence. Mr. Ludwig said that the term "disorderly house" was scarcely applicable to McConkey's that night. There was no test of disorderly conduct. A ball game or hockey match was noisy. He appeared much of the opinion that the result of the trial in the police court was a foregone conclusion. The magistrate had almost put words in crown witnesses' mouths, he said. He scouted the idea that 30 or 40 women had come from the hotel. Many wild stories had been told. How true these were no one seemed to know. The remarks of the magistrate that witnesses had got together to arrange their evidence he characterized as a crime.

The hearing ended in the afternoon.

FIELD ICE WORST IN N. S. HISTORY

Has Come South and Shipping is Tied Up—Vessels Held Fast.

SYDNEY, N.S., March 9.—A telephone message from Louisburg says that the collier Eslington is still fast in the ice off that port. The Dominion Coal Company's tug, Douglas H. Thomas, is standing by the steamer, sometimes towing her thru the open leads in the fields and again moving alongside and pushing the pans out of the steamer's path. The ship is about a mile and a half off shore, and is not making much headway.

Heavy ocean ice is tightly packed on the coast, and shipping is for the present stalled.

Pilots at the Louisburg station report the steamer Astoria, bound to Louisburg, jammed in the ice near the automatic buoy off Gabarus. It is not likely the ship will be able to force passage thru today.

The SS Cabot, bound for the same port, is also held up by the floes several miles southwest of Guyon Island, some six or eight miles south of Louisburg.

A third ship, name unknown, can be made out from the pilot station built down on the horizon.

Both the Hochelaga and Louisburg, coal laden, have been held up at Louisburg awaiting favorable opportunity to sail. These vessels will get away when the ice melts off the coast.

Armeries who have travelled this coast for years say they do not remember when the ice held so far south as they do this spring.

NEW LAKE VESSEL TO BE BOND OF HARMONY.

Duluth and Fort William Will Now Become More Neighbourly.

FORT WILLIAM, March 9.—Conveying a delegation of representative Port William citizens, the steamer Noronic, the Northern Navigation Co.'s palatial new passenger boat, may make her first important trip to Duluth some time early in the coming navigation season. The purposes of this trip are to bring about more neighbourly relations between the Canadian and American board of the lakes.

The proposition is now being considered by the local board of trade, and it is understood that it will be taken up jointly perhaps by the boards of trade of the two cities.

CAT ROOSTS WITH CHICKENS HAS MOTHERED WHOLE FLOCK.

WAWOTA, Sask., March 9.—The unusual sight of a cat "roosting" with poultry at night is daily seen on the farm of J. E. Merrick. During the winter, however, pussy was nightly missed until recently, when she was discovered snugly perched between two young hens in the centre of the flock.

CALGARY REALTY PRICES REVIVE

Interest in City and Farm Properties Much Better in West.

CALGARY, March 9.—A marked revival of interest in real estate movement is indicated by the present volume of business transacted at the Calgary land titles office. During the month of February, ordinarily a quiet month, business increased materially. The character of the transfers proves that purchasers are meeting their payments on both city and farm property, and are putting thru their transfers as they did before the financial stringency. Nor do the transfers show a shrinkage in property values, either city or country.

Farm land values are increasing, and a large number of farms have been sold and resold within the past month at advanced prices. Calgary subdivision property is changing hands at a rapid rate, scores of transfers being recorded daily. Increment tax receipts for February exceeded those for December and January, and show that property values are on the upturn as well.

NOVA SCOTIA CARPENTERS WANT INCREASE IN PAY

Three Dollars a Day Not High Enough for Maritime Workmen.

SYDNEY, N.S., March 9.—The secretary of the local Trades and Labor Council, acting on behalf of the carpenters of Sydney, Glace Bay and district, is sending out a personal letter to the master builders of the district, drawing attention to the conditions of labor and the wages paid in this district. It is claimed that the conditions are not on a par with those of Halifax, St. John, Amherst and other parts nearby, to say nothing of the larger centres, where the cost of living is not so high. It is urgently pointed out that in order to retain the services in this district of the most competent men, some considerable betterment is necessary in the circumstances of the mechanics employed by local firms and building contractors. Journeymen joiners in this district are paid \$3 per day.
