religiously to the ancient system; that a claim of new privileges by the Americans, for they have been taxed before by our parliament, will be attended with many immediate disadvantages, and that the remote consequence will

be their own ruin and flavery.

But if, after all, the prejudices of the Americans should be fo great as to make them reject all reasonable terms of accommodation, should they be fo tenacious of what they call their privileges, as to be fully refolved on afferting an absolute independence on the parliament of Great Britain. Should they be determined, rather than yield to it as formerly, to proceed to the last extremity, I would, with all due deference to the wisdom of parliament, advise a certain number of contiguous provinces to be incorporated, and to be allowed parliaments under the fame restriction as that of Ireland.

If they decline this equitable compromise, were I a member of either House, I would give my vote for treat-
