

# Trade in Toronto

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's that seasonable spring weather has been a great stimulus to business. Retail merchants report the Easter trade as having been very active, dry goods and boots and shoes particularly are busy at this time. Wholesale dry goods houses chiefly complain of a shortage of goods, and inability to supply the deficiency. Prices are rapidly advancing, which has caused some hesitation on the part of customers to purchase. On the other hand they find that it is the only way to secure the goods, and in the end they are forced to pay the higher prices. Wholesale houses are looking for a busy month in April in the line of carpets, rugs, oil cloths and other house furnishings.

In grocery lines, two refineries have recently announced an advance of 25 cents per cwt, in the price of sugar. Some refineries are only quoting nominally as they are entirely without supplies. Lack of vessel space from Cuba is advanced as the chief American refined, pails, 152s; American refined, boxes, 150s.

Tallow, Australian in London, 72s. reason for the shortage. Oranges have advanced again, the increase amounting to from 50 cents to \$1.00 per case. There is quite a demand for dried fruits, but stocks of prunes and apricots are showing depletion Potatoes and other domestic vegetables are easier in price. Eggs have dropped another couple of cents, but butter remains firm. The grain trade is quiet with receipts light. Hides continue easy with little demand. Collections are fair, but this month is being looked to as a good one in the way of payments.
