PENSION SYSTEM FOR MAIL CARRIERS

Scheme is Endorsed at Hamilton Convention, and Details Are Outlined.

A SPLIT WAS FEARED

East and West Disagreed Over Strike, But Harmony Restored by Explanation.

Hamilton, Sept. 5.—A four-hour session was held this evening of the Federated Association of Letter Carriers, meeting in convention in the Royal Connaught Hotel. Beyond the reading of the report of the executive committee, which discussion was laid over until tomorrow, the entire session was given up to a rather animated discussion of the situation, east and west, in connection with the recent postmen's strike. There had developed a marked difference in opinion between the eastern and western branches of the federation as a result of the dispute which was settled but a short time ago, and a split in the association was feared by not a few of the leading spirits. However, harmony came out of the lengthy discussion of the evening. The delegates from the west stated they had taken action on receipt of a telegram which they considered to indicate that a strike was endorsed by the entire federation. Had they known that the actual conditions were local to Toronto, or principally in the direction of a strike. The course they followed was due wholly to the fact that they were deceived by the telegram referred to.

Consideration of the report of the committee on constitution and laws was resumed at this morning's session. William A. McDonald, of Toronto, read by A. McDonald. Some amendments were made and other recommendations along that line are to come up later.

A resolution from the Dominion Postal Clerks' Association, Toronto, was read by A. McDonald. This resolution, on which no action was taken, it being held, urged that a joint executive be formed, consisting of the members of the Dominion Postal Clerks' Association, the Carriers' Association and the railway mail clerks, this body to be given the governing power to take whatever united action is necessary to place the claims of the civil servants before the government.

The postal clerks in favor of this committee propose to petition the government for another conference cabinet with which they conferred on August 6, this conference to be held just before the next session of parliament, and the following demands to be presented:

1. Equal salaries for east and west, as there is no justification for a distinction.
2. The present war bonus to be

A telegram was received from Winnipeg urging that all possible efforts be made to heal the threatened split between east and west which, it was pointed out, would be an almost irreparable disaster.

Considerable discussion was evoked by a motion to amend the clause of the constitution relating to the barring of officers in the association, or eligibility as delegates, carriers who may be promoted and transferred, this including carriers who may be acting temporarily as sorters, clerks or supervising officers. The word "temporarily" was struck out.

A resolution was offered recommending the establishment of a pension system among the grade mail carriers based on the following:

That the government keep 5 per cent of the salary of mail men for 25 years, and at the expiration of that time they shall be entitled to ask for a pension amounting to the sum of \$2.50 per month for every year of service.

In case of death, the 5 per cent, kept from his salary, shall be given to his dependents, or if said member shall resign he shall be entitled to a refund of the money shall be refunded to him with interest at the rate of 4 per cent.

This resolution was adopted with the exception of the 4 per cent. rate, this being changed to six per cent.

The report of the executive committee was taken up clause by clause, this report, submitted by J. J. Reeves, reviewed concisely the activities of the committee since the last meeting.

HOUSEKEEPERS GETTING A LITTLE COAL IN BINS

"There is a little coal coming in all the time, and more will come forward after the exhibition is over," said J. B. Harris of W. Harris and Company, Broadview avenue, to a reporter yesterday, discussing the fuel situation.

"Altho the situation is somewhat serious, you would be surprised to know how many householders in the city have three and four tons in their cellars at the present time," said Mr. Harris. "In many instances coal has been sent to people's houses who were away from home, and others would give instructions not to send the coal on Friday or Saturday, 'as we are going out,' they would say. However, some arrangement might be made by the board of control to work in conjunction with the police in the supervision of the distribution of coal, and to see that no one person gets more than a load of coal at one time. Every police officer could keep a lookout on his beat and stop more than one load going into the grounds."

A meeting of the directors of the Broadview Boys' Y.M.C.A. fall fair was held in the board room, Broadview avenue, last evening. Chas. E. Howarth occupied the chair. Reports of committees were received, and the two special matters discussed were advertising and chief features of the fair.

Some of the attractions decided upon are: A boys' naval brigade demonstration on the grand stand, including the display of the national flag of the Y.M.C.A. exhibit, promised by the officials for the fall fair. Returned soldiers in uniform will be admitted free of charge into the grounds.

There was a good attendance of the directors.

BUILDING IS BRISK IN DANFORTH SECTION

The building trade is brisk at the present time in the Danforth section. The firm of Grant and Stevens, Danforth avenue, has at present in course of construction six semi-detached houses on Danforth avenue near Dawes road, which will be of the bungalow type, two storey high and containing six rooms. The firm is also erecting one large solid brick residence on Aldridge avenue, and many plans of large houses are being prepared by Mr. Stevens for future erection.

As an instance of the activity in building Mr. Stevens stated that a two-story frame house on Aldridge avenue was started, finished, sold and occupied within one month recently. It is almost impossible to get houses to rent in this section," said Mr. Grant, "but houses can be had for sale in many parts of the east end."

WEATHER IMPEDES WORK ON VIADUCT

With the exception of about 20 feet of wood block roadway laid on the south side of the main bridge track allowance, yesterday, practically no other work was done on the Don viaduct. The heavy rainfall of the previous night, it is said, impeded the work in progress on the other sections.

Five hundred feet of roadway on the south side of the track allowance on the main bridge still remains to be completed, and at the present rate of progress it will take another ten days to finish the work.

A letter was read from Ottawa regarding soldiers' pensions and the regulations governing the same. A letter was also read from a comrade of this branch, now in the hospital, thanking the association for visits and gifts. He said he had taken the first prize for "awakening the leg" in the hospital.

The veterans decided to grant the use of the hall on night a week to the new boys' brass band, the members of which were nearly all soldiers' sons. New instruments had been purchased for the use of the boys.
