

SIBERIAN BLIZZARD SWEEPS OVER OMSK

London, Feb. 25 .- The Times publishes a despatch from Omsk, in which it is announced that the town has been swept by a "buran," the terrible Siberian blizzard. The hurricane rolled huge lumps of ice along the streets, and rendered it impossible to remain outdoors alive. Acres of iron roofing were carried away. described as catastrophic owing to the enormous proportion of engines rendered as serviceable thru the severe weather and the famine in fuel and lubricating oil.

Food prices are soaring, and many cases of typhus are reported, while hospital accommodation is extremely limited. The prisoner problem is causing much concern. Great hardships are being suffered by Austrian, German and Turkish officers and 95,000 men, owing to the lack of fuel and food.
